Benefice Letter

s summer draws to a close, some of us have been considering how this time of year gives us even more of a moment to reflect on endings and beginnings than we do at New Year. For in September we see the culmination of much hard work, both in the classroom and the fields and are about to take steps forward that will lead us into the next year.

For many, this is the month for a whole new start, arriving at school or college for the first time. Whether it is Reception Class in primary school or Freshers Week at university, there will be excitement and a degree of nervousness. For others it may be the end of exams and the start of a new course or even a first job.

It is also when we celebrate the results of the countryside's labours in our farms and fields with our Harvest Festivals. There has been haymaking and harvesting in our area throughout the summer months but now nearly all is gathered in and there must be relief that crops have survived the driest summer in 200 years. But even as the tractors ferry their final loads from the fields the cycle is already just about to start again, with preparations in hand for ploughing and sowing next year's crops. In gardens too, the keen horticulturists in our region will be taking stock of thirsty borders and deciding what they can grow next year, as well as hastening to plant daffodils bulbs before the end of the month and tulips by late November.

At a time when we are constantly unnerved by news of troubles around the world, by serious concerns about the impact of climate change and are still reeling from the long-term shock of the pandemic, the constancy of the environment around our benefice is reassuring. We are perhaps more fortunate than those living in conurbations in that we can see the cycle of life performing before our very eyes every day. The fields will be ploughed, they will be sown and planted, and the crops will do their best to grow, despite the rain or lack of it. The sheep will graze and the ram will tup the ewes in November to ensure there is lamb for Easter.

And we find this reassurance in the Bible too, for instance in Exodus 12:2, *This month shall be unto you the beginning of months: it shall be the first month of the year to you.* We are ready and eager for a new start because we believe and trust in God. An appropriate thought for our benefice as a whole, given that we too are facing a new beginning in the very near future with the arrival of a new vicar to lead us forward. We hope we can build upon the solid foundation that has been achieved in the last few years, uniting all our churches in faith and community.



Karamoja Famine Appeal

As you may know for many years the churches in the Alton area (Deanery) have been supporting the churches in the province of Karamoja in north east Uganda. The two dioceses that make up this region cover an area larger than Wales. Most people are subsistence farmers and cattle herders. They have reported to us that after very poor rains and low harvest yields if any, there is a famine in this region. People have begun to die from starvation. Already 900 people are reported to have died but the number may be much higher. We are trying to raise at least £5,000 to support relief efforts. Bentley CE Primary

Bentley is officially a Plastic Free School!

Last January Bentley School's Eco-Council set out on its journey to become a Plastic Free School. Following the Surfers Against Sewage programme, with support from



Madame Jones, the team of 13 children from Year 1 to Year 6, started working through the 5 objectives to reduce the amount of single-use plastic produced in school Activities included a litter pick called a 'Trash Mob' as well as writing and interviewing our MP Damian Hinds last November. Along the way, the Eco-Council have involved their classmates with an assembly, surveys and regular class updates. Last Autumn, the Eco-Council even produced a video for the East Hampshire COP26 event to inspire other schools to participate in the scheme.



For the final objective to become a Plastic Free School, we had to reduce three items of single-use plastic in our school. The children chose: cling film in lunchboxes which we successfully reduced by 70%; polystyrene pots for ice-creams in school


lunches which were replaced by a large tub of ice-cream and a scoop and finally sweets in plastic wrappers at PTFA events which were replaced by new plasticfree pick and mix sweets at the school's summer BFest event!

Achieving Plastic Free School status is just the start for us as a school. Eco-Council will continue working alongside Surfers Against Sewage to reduce our

reliance on single-use plastic in the school. However, right now huge congratulations must go to all the Eco-Council representatives who have participated in this award and especially Nic, Luke and Eva in Year 6! Power to the Pupils!

WAYMARKS...

Maintaining Binsted's Rights of Way network

The long spell of warm, dry weather, including July's scorching heatwave, means that the footpaths and bridleways of the parish are very dry and easy to walk. Many parts of Hampshire have had no measurable rainfall in the whole of July. During hot weather, you just have to pick the right time of day for a walk, particularly if you have a canine friend with you. I hope there weren't too many walkers and dogs out and about on the 18th and 19th of July, when temperatures were at unheard of, record-breaking levels!

As we expected, due to the loss of our HCC Community Ranger, there has been very little in the way of more substantial maintenance working parties this summer, since we rely so heavily on HCC to supply the specialist tools and materials - we provide the hard labour! The two larger projects we had in mind, which involved rebuilding flights of steps, are still unscheduled. Until we have a replacement HCC Ranger, I fear that we will be very much on our own and restricted to tasks that we can carry out already, such as cutting back vegetation and the like. Let's hope that the next few months bring some good news on that front.

Harvest time

We're coming into harvest time for the next generation of trees. From what I can see it should be a good harvest this year. After all, adult trees have been able to survive the drought better than other plants and most set their seeds before the dry weather started.

We have a target this year to plant 400 seeds and nuts, and I ordered starter pots to match. Both primary schools, Binsted and Rowledge are signed up to 80 pots each. They will be out collecting in September or October. We're looking therefore for only six individuals or groups to collect and plant 40 pots each. Contact me at binstedtrees@gmail.com if you want to join in.

Actually 40's quite a lot when you think you will have 40 young trees to find a home for in a year or so. But the choice is so extensive that you can plan a crop of a variety of species for many different situations.

The choices are these:

pods – e.g. Indian bean tree a tree with a bright future as our climate changes, laburnum(remember, though, these are poisonous)

winged seeds – e.g. silver birch, field maples, sycamore, Norway maple, hornbeam

nuts – e.g. hazel, oak(acorns), sweet chestnut, horse chestnut, walnut, beech

fleshy fruits – e.g. elder, crab apple, rowan, holly (but I always feel the wildlife should have first pickings, especially with yew)

cones – e.g. pine, alder (leave all cones in paper bags to dry out, then give the bag a shake to release the seeds)

All the above are growing somewhere in our parish, and most can be harvested from the ground around the parent trees, so no need to go climbing.

Let me make a few comments that may guide your choices:

I have to admit that my favourites are all in the winged seed category and very easy to propagate. In a way this is because they are not particularly popular with seed eaters and so must find their own way in the world. This they do by taking to the air to fly away

from the mother tree. I have my own hornbeam which every year gives me saplings throughout the garden without any effort on my part. Field maple may be a poor man's acer but they're no less beautiful for that. And they're free.

Nuts have the advantage that they come with their own food supply and so are not dependent on the medium they are initially planted in. A simple test of viability is to drop them in a bucket of water. The floaters are no good (not like witches, then).

A special word finally for alder. Such a fascinating tree. No conifer but it bears cones. Tap them and a mass of tiny black seeds drop out. You'll find alder in damp places few other trees enjoy - along the banks of the Wey, or at the foot of our many hangers where water drains down from the clay banks. They have this special ability to grow on poor soils and work with their fungus partners to improve it. The flip side of the droughts we will have to endure is that we will also see more flooding as a result of intense rains. We need more trees like this, and willows to grow on the flood plain and mitigate the damage.

What to do about the South East's increasing drought risk?

f heatwaves are climate change's swift and deadly invasion troops, then drought is its slow but crippling undercover agent. This summer, Britain is experiencing both.

After the blistering heatwave that set the UK's new record 40.3C high temperature, it's no surprise to learn that July was the driest July on record in southern England since records began in 1836. Hampshire is amongst the worst-affected counties, and Odiham was Britain's driest place, with zero July rainfall. As I write this, the UK faces another heatwave, with the Met Office warning 'little meaningful rain' is forecast. Europe has it worse. Which piles pressure on our already-strained food system.

Nature too is suffering. Tragic wildfires recently devasted Hankley Common, home to all of the UK's native reptile species, rare species of dragonflies, and rare birds such as woodlarks and nightjars. Not all of Hankley's large common has been destroyed, but the animal rescue teams that are currently onsite, looking for survivors, are finding desperately few, and it'll be many years before the burnt habitat recovers.

It's scary we're already seeing such big climate shocks today, at just over 1 degree of warming above pre-industrial levels. And it's hardly surprising that we can feel powerless to do anything about climate change, or about its damage to our wildlife. We clearly need to start managing water as if it really is a precious resource ... but what's the point, we might ask, if water companies fail to fix water pipe leaks that lose over 20 per cent of our public water supply?

Yet studies of people who do take action on climate change show that taking action has a much more powerful impact than we might think. As Henry Ford famously said: 'Whether you think you can, or can't, you're right!' If enough people believe we're powerful and take action to beat climate change, we will. If enough people think we're powerless and can't stop it, we won't.

As far as drought's concerned, there's loads that can be done. And not just 'showering with a friend', as was famously taught back in 1976! There are technological fixes, like efficient, aerated taps; and landscape-restoration, like creating ponds and restoring wetlands, to hold water in the landscape for longer.

Binsted Eco Network can't fix the drought! But the 300 households who subscribe to our free fortnightly newsletter are making quite a difference, both by getting involved in local wildlife projects like the landscape restoration at Blacknest Fields, and by keeping informed.

Binsted Parish Council's had a busy and productive summer

We have some new councillors

It's nice to have some really good news to share: In May, Val Moynan from Isington joined our team of councillors: followed by Graham Jones from Binsted village, who joined the team in June. As this article goes to press, two further parishioners are expected to join the team in September. This means that, by the time you read this, we hope we will have EIGHT councillors - just one recruit away from reaching our full complement of Nine.

Getting the council team up to full strength is particularly important in Binsted, because it's such a large parish. There's a surprising variation in the sizes of Parish Councils. At 7,000 acres, Binsted is one of Hampshire's biggest parishes, and has about 2,000 residents - which means that each of

our nine councillors is 'responsible' for nearly 800 acres, and some 220 people. Whereas guite a lot of local parishes which have similar numbers of councillors have a much smaller parish area, or far fewer residents, or both. It's nice to find out why our parish patch always seems so busy!

We'll include some 'mugshots' of the council team in next month's edition. In the meanwhile, let me reassure you that, in the nicest possible way, our entire team is incredibly ordinary! Which I feel is exactly what a parish council should be like. Parish Councils are places where ordinary people can come together to make decisions about issues they care about: protecting the environment, keeping facilities in good repair, improving local services ... Our topics rarely make headline news, but the discussions feel human and grounded. We focus on the things people talk about when they bump into neighbours in the street: a temporary footpath closure, or whether unwelcome planning applications will disfigure the area.

It will be great if we can recruit a final, ninth councillor, and finally reach full strength. It doesn't matter whether you're currently in work, an at-home Mum. someone who's retired, or a young person seeking volunteer experience at the start of your working life ... if you think that you might be sufficiently 'ordinary' for the role, do email Lisa Spindler, our Parish Clerk, at clerk@ binstedparishcouncil.org.uk. Or talk to any of the existing councillors. The role of being a councillor is more rewarding than you might expect, and we'd be excited to hear from you.

We're also 'buzzing' with excitement about Blacknest Fields (pardon the pun!)

The Parish Council's work to transform its site at Blacknest Fields into a place for nature recovery received a boost this summer, with news that South Downs National Park has agreed to fund our 'Get Blacknest Buzzing' project, a new three-year project to expand the range and abundance of pollinators and wildflowers at our Blacknest Fields site. This funding will help us to make

improvements in the management regime, to make the site even better for butterflies and other pollinators; and it will also enable the parish council to run some outreach and education activities.

In fact, the 8-acre site's already a great place to see butterflies, and we've spent the past few weeks working with some fantastic local volunteer wildlife recorders, to develop a baseline of wildlife found at the site, so we'll be able to measure how the site's wildlife profile changes in the future.

The results of the moth survey were particularly spectacular – thanks to local expert Martin Angel, we found 56 species of moth, including some spectacularly large and beautiful hawkmoths.
