Benefice Letter

"At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them"

As someone with a keen interest in military history, it was with a large measure of awe and respect that, by becoming Vicar of the benefice of Bentley, Binsted and Froyle, I learned that I would become the custodian of the grave of Field Marshall 1st Viscount Montgomery of Alamein. In this month, where we gather to remember those who have died in the World Wars and other conflicts. The significance of what we do seems even more pertinent, given the current situation in the world.

Writing to his troops before the D-Day landings of 6th June 1944, Montgomery said.

"On the eve of this great adventure I send my best wishes to every soldier in the Allied team.

To us is given the honour of striking a blow for freedom which will live in history; and in the better days that lie ahead men will speak with pride of our doings."

As we read the roll of honour at the services of Remembrance in our parishes, we will remember the names and number of young men who died on land, in the air and at sea fighting for the freedoms we treasure, but sometimes fail to protect. War is evil, but sometimes becomes tragically necessary. When diplomacy and the actions of politicians fail, war becomes the only option when faced with naked aggression and inhuman barbarity as we see in the Russian invasion of the Ukraine.

As Christians, we are instructed, "Do not repay anyone evil for evil. If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Do not take revenge, my dear friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written "It is mine to avenge; I will repay," says the Lord." Romans 12:17-19.

We remember this month the cost of war and the cost of freedom. Our villages suffered the loss of so many young men: sons, husbands, fathers who would never see their homes again. We pray for peace in our world and for an end to bloodshed and war. For a swift end to the conflict in the Ukraine and other parts of God's earth. We pray for leaders with integrity, compassion and commitment who will wisely work for the good of all. And we remember the warning, that all it takes for evil to prosper, is for good men to do nothing. May we remember. May we also resolve to seek and strive for peace and to pray for that promise of God, that one day men will not train for war anymore.

WICKHAM INSTITUTE/ BINSTED CHURCH HARVEST SUPPER

On Saturday 8th October 2022, for the first time since April 2019, we were able to come together for a village supper in the Wickham Institute.

We were treated to cottage pie followed by an array of different crumbles all home cooked. This was followed by three sessions of a quiz style "head and tails" game where a donation to the funds enabled participants to win a cash prize.

This was a fundraising event with the net proceeds being split equally between the Wickham Institute and Binsted Church. The church proceeds will go towards fabric projects such as the East Window appeal and the cost of the replacement of flooring in the church tower. The net proceeds amounted to \pounds 1,253.

A thoroughly enjoyable evening was had by all and our thanks to Hilary Spicer and her team of helpers for all the hard work they put in to make the evening go so well.



Holy Cross Church, Binsted Storm Damage Repair Update

Work to repair the storm damage at Holy Cross Church is going well and the roofs and external render are almost finished so we're hoping this area of scaffolding will come down soon.

Most of the damaged plaster inside the church has now been replaced and 'all' that's left to do is for the builders to decorate it. Several areas were found where old repairs had reached the end of their life, so the underlying issues are being addressed which has added a further delay to re-opening the church. We're currently planning on mid-November and are hoping to be able to use the church for Remembrance. If we still can't open the church we'll hold an Act of Remembrance followed (weather permitting) by a short outdoor service. Please check the Benefice website https://www.benbinfro.co.uk/ for the latest information about this.

Work has now started on the tower which also has both historic damage and storm damage. The floor in the ground floor ringing chamber has been condemned and we have been forbidden to enter the tower until it's been made safe. Sadly, this means that our bell ringers can't practice or ring, so it's going to be rather quiet for a few weeks. The clock has also been deliberately stopped to protect it and will be restarted once the work is complete.

We'll get the church open again as soon as we can, and it will look really smart.



Parish Weatherman



A s part of the Alton Autumn Walking Festival I was asked to organise a tree walk round the town, to include the Flood Meadows north of Lenten Street and St Lawrence's churchyard. Looking at the map it made sense to me to take in the Public Gardens as well, and to start and finish in the Market Square. I needed to consult a map because I'm sorry to say the territory was unknown to me, despite living close by for several decades.

I was delighted with what I discovered – an embarrassment of riches when it comes to trees! Although the route was still short of two miles we were to pass by 330 trees of 50 distinct species. These are heady numbers for a country tree warden like me. I know them to be accurate because Alton Town Council has taken care to survey all the parks for which it is responsible, and the details are published on their website.

Naturally, not all these trees are native, however you define that description, but they are all doing well, by and large. Of course, this year's drought has had its impact. For starters the River Wey was dry at this time. The resident ducks and moorhens are left waddling about in the mud, more harassed than ever by the local dogs.

The horse chestnuts have been particularly badly affected. Those leaves left uneaten by burrowing moth caterpillars were brown and shrivelled. Nevertheless the trees were full of conkers. I urge children to collect as many as you can (and adults too) because the shrivelled leaves will not be able to replenish the trees' energy stores so we cannot expect such a bumper crop next year.

Otherwise, though, there was plenty to see, and the highlights for me were these:

Both in the Public Gardens and St Lawrence's, impressive Wellingtonia – Giant Sequoia, Sequoiadendron giganteum, once common throughout the world but, since the ice age, native only to California. These giants have a number of survival strategies for living longer and growing taller than any other tree. Amongst these their bark is thick and soft and rich in tannin, to allow them to survive most forest fires.

If you follow the board walk beside the Wey through the Flood Meadows you will not miss a large, gorgeous willow. It is quite similar to our native white willow, but even more 'weepy'. It is, in fact, Salix babylonica, a species of willow native to dry areas of northern China, but cultivated for millennia elsewhere in Asia, being traded along the Silk Road to southwest Asia and Europe. It is the subject of the Chinese willow pattern which decorates many grannies' crockery. It grows rapidly, but has a short lifespan, between 40 and 75 years. The leaves turn a gold-yellow in autumn.

The most water-loving native tree, the alder, Alnus glutinosa, is also present in numbers in the Flood Meadows. The bark is dark and fissured and is often covered in lichen. Young twigs are sticky to touch-hence glutinosa. The leaves are vivid green, pear-shaped, deeply veined and slightly indented at the tip. Alder is the only British native deciduous tree to develop cones. Soft and porous, alder wood is only durable if kept wet, and its value to humans is down to its ability to withstand rotting in water. Historically, it has been used in the construction of boats, sluice gates and water pipes. The piles upon which both Venice and Amsterdam were built are made from this wood. It thrives in damp, cool areas such as marshes, wet woodland and streams where its roots help to prevent soil erosion and mitigate flood damage.

Great News!

The National Lottery Heritage Fund has awarded Hampshire Cultural Trust (HCT) an initial grant for the re-design and development of the **Allen Gallery and Garden**. The Gallery holds a nationally significant collection of ceramics.

HCT will apply for a full grant of $\pounds I$ million at a later date, which will be used to enhance the visitor experience in the Gallery and boost Alton as a place to live, work and visit.

The Gallery is one of the local community's focal points. As well as the permanent display of ceramics, it hosts a wide range of exhibitions on a variety of mainly local subjects, and activities for many age groups. There is also an important annual display of works by the artist W H Allen, from whom it gets its name. The new project aims to enhance these features.

Planning will take until December 2023, physical redevelopment thereafter, and the whole project will hopefully be completed in 2025. Closure of the Gallery will be kept to a minimum.

What's happening to Bentley's Neighbourhood Plan

It would be true to say that our attempts to organise the Neighbourhood Plan for Bentley could be likened to one of the celebrities on Strictly Come Dancing. All along the process we have tried to keep in step with the EHDC Local Plan but while we have made some progress, irritatingly, we have now been given a new set of guidelines to follow.

Just to recap, where and how many new houses are to be built in Bentley, as in all other parishes in East Hampshire, is determined and approved by the District Council, in accordance with the EHDC Local Plan. Following instructions from the UK Government to increase the number of new houses to be built across the UK in 2019 EHDC started to update its Local Plan, which in turn required Parish Councils to update their Neighbourhood Plans.

To the frustration of many in EHDC the Government has once again changed the goalposts which has caused EHDC to largely restart its Local Plan again. Regrettably this could leave local parishes exposed to unwanted proposals for development and the Bentley Neighbourhood team therefore decided at a recent meeting that it will be best for Bentley if, regardless of the position of the EHDC Local Plan, it continues with our Neighbourhood Plan with the intention of completing it early in the New Year.

We will provide an update on progress before the end of this year via the Bentley Parish Council website and the Bentley Village Events Facebook page.



Calling all wildlife enthusiasts - we'd love your help with some hedge planting and wildlife recording!

Over the summer, it was wonderful to discover just how much amazing wildlife there is at the parish council's 'Blacknest Fields' site. Clouds of butterflies, moths and bats, thriving populations of lizards and slow worm, and interesting birds and flora. It's been spectacular. Now, in autumn, we've some serious planting to do!



- The South Downs National Park has donated lots of tree and hedge plants to the parish council, through its 'Trees for the Downs' scheme, to improve habitats at Blacknest Fields. Which means it's 'all hands on deck', to plant 130m of new hedges.
- We've also won funding for some fruit trees, and will be planting a small community orchard, to help pollinating insects in the spring.

It would be great if you can join this community volunteer hedge planting party, to lend a hand. Children are welcome too. A soup lunch will be provided, to help keep everyone fuelled up! For planning purposes, ideally let us know you're coming by emailing <u>BNF@binstedparishcouncil.org.uk</u>. Or simply turn up on the day, with your wellies and gardening gloves.

Also - would any keen wildlife enthusiasts like to join our growing community of volunteer wildlife recorders?

Pumpkin Soup Recipe

Preparation time less than 30 mins

Cooking time 30 mins to 1 hour

Serves 6-8

By Annie Rigg – BBC Food

Ingredients

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 carrots, peeled and chopped
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1 bay leaf
- 25g/1oz unsalted butter
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 medium pumpkin (prepared weight about 850g/1lb 14oz) deseeded and roughly chopped
- 1 medium-sized **floury potato**, such as Maris Piper, roughly chopped
- 1 litre/1¾ pint vegetable or chicken **stock**, a little extra may be needed
- 100ml/3½fl oz double cream
- 3 tbsp pumpkin seeds
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

- Put the onion, carrots, garlic bay leaf, butter and half the olive oil into a large pan. Cook over a low-medium heat for about 10 minutes until the vegetables are tender but not coloured.
- Add the squash and potato, mix to combine and cook for a further 2–3 minutes. Pour in the stock, season well and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to a gentle simmer, half cover the pan with a lid and continue to cook for about 40 minutes until the squash is really tender when tested with the point of a knife.
- Pick out the bay leaf and blend the soup until smooth using a stick blender.
- Add the cream and a little more stock if the soup is on the thick side, taste for seasoning, adding more salt and pepper as required.
- Meanwhile, heat the remaining oil in a frying pan over a medium heat and add the pumpkin seeds and fry quickly until the seeds start to pop. Remove from the pan.
- Ladle the soup into bowls and serve with a swirl of cream and the toasted pumpkin seeds.

From a position of almost certain defeat, somehow Archer found the courage and determination to help guide his side to one of the greatest turnarounds in living memory.

England started Day 5 on 98 for 5 trailing by an almost impossible 345 where a draw was seen as difficult at best. Archer took the game by the scruff of the neck in the morning session with some textbook cover drives off of some good Australian bowling and it was evident very early that he had not given up on a classic win, beautifully backed up by the now aging England captain Ben Stokes (38) with a gutsy 97.

The afternoon session saw Archer convert his innings

to a memorable century, much to the delight of the Lords crowd including his parents and colleagues from his beloved Bentley Archers Cricket Club who watched on with immense pride...



NO APPEAL FOR INCINERATOR PLAN

Veolia has not submitted an appeal against the refusal for their plan for an enormous commercial incinerator in the rural Wey Valley. Hampshire County Council's Regulatory Committee turned down the plan on February 23, with an overwhelming majority of twelve votes to three.

The company could have appealed within six months of that refusal, but that deadline was passed on September 8. However, the Parish Councils will continue to monitor any future plans for the current Veolia site. They will also be checking all revisions to Hampshire's Minerals and Waste Plan to ensure that the capacity offered by the county's three existing incinerators continues to be more than enough for Hampshire's needs, especially if the currently poor recycling rates are improved.

The No Wey Incinerator campaign group is immensely grateful to all the supporters who backed the campaign with sound objections, the circulation of leaflets and financial donations, which meant expert consultants could be employed to defeat this unacceptable proposal.

Two weeks in the life of a bell ringer

Monday 5th September

16:30 - Bentley to oil bearings and adjust the ropes, prior to quarter peal before the service of institution of Rev. Matt Boyes. Simon & John from the Bentley band came to help.

Home to find a message on the answerphone. Despite a promise from the builders to give us seven days notice, the scaffolding needed for access to repair the ringing room ceiling is going up on Thursday 08-Sept!

Hasty return of call to Andrew to confirm requirements. Ringing room needs to be cleared for the work. I can't do Wednesday, previous engagement, so it has to be Tuesday. Also it means we cannot hold our usual Thursday practices for an indefinite period (Sunday service ringing already stopped due to the building works).

Quick email to Simon at Bentley to see if we can move our practice there. Urgent email sent to Binsted band asking for help 14:00 tomorrow to clear the tower.

Rapid reply (affirmative) from Simon.

Email Binsted band and regular visitors to inform them that practice transferred to Bentley for next 3 weeks at least. Also email the local ringers branch members to let them know practice transferred.

19:45 - Bramshott for their weekly practice.

Tuesday 06th September

14:00 – Binsted clear tower. Andrew, Brenda, Kaye & Jacci came to help. Took photos first, so we could put things back more easily. Boxed everything up that we could, moved table to Prayer Corner. Put benches and other large items under the beams at the side. Removed bellropes. Stopped the clock and set hands to 12:00 (the standard "signal" that a public clock is not working). Covered the bell bearings and clock with dust sheets. Boxes and bags now stored away from tower.

Wednesday 7th September

18:00 - Bentley to ring guarter peal for institution of Rev. Matt Boyes, due to start at 18:15. Had a chat with Matt before we started ringing, while waiting for one ringer who was late due to being let down by child care. Eventually started 18:35, had to ring fast to finish in time. Left bells "up" ready to ring for Friday's wedding, except for the Tenor which was rung "down" so that it could be chimed by Matt during the service. Spoke with a few people after the service, had a good chat with the Archdeacon about bells & ringers. Simon from Bentley and Anita from Binsted also took part.

Thursday 8th September

Heard on radio news that the Queen was unwell. As the news was not getting better through the day downloaded the ringing / flag guidance documents from Church of England and The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers. Oh dear, all a bit confusing and contradictory especially timings in places. Bells to be rung fully muffled if possible, then muffles removed for proclamation of the King, then muffled again until after ringing on 19th September, when muffles are to be removed. Similar rules for the flag, half mast, then full mast, back to half mast, back to full mast. Clearly whoever came up with all that, had no idea what it actually entails, with both Bentley & Binsted I've got to do at least 10 trips up and down the towers in a matter of a few days - and what about access to Binsted tower due to building works? And (oh no!) we left five bells at Bentley "up" (ready to ring) for the wedding on Friday.

So start thinking about what to do. The official announcement of the death of Her Majesty is made after 16:00, meaning everything starts tomorrow according to the guidance (phew!), except the flag which should go up at half mast immediately. According to the documents Friday is D-Day (oh come on, surely they could do better) and the next day is D-Day+1, and so on. By the time I've got answers about access it's late and starting to get dark, so decide there's no point in putting the flag up until tomorrow morning when the builders are there to ensure H&S requirements met.

Ringers start "crying-off" ringing tonight, so email everyone to cancel the practice at Bentley I've just arranged.

19:30 - Bentley, in case anyone hasn't heard and turns up to ring, and to ring five bells down. Meanwhile the wedding rehearsal is going ahead in the Church. Anita speaks to the Vicar & Churchwardens, ringing for the wedding has been cancelled. Happily, the wedding itself is still going ahead. Disappointing because the wedding is the marriage of the daughter of Sue, one of the Binsted band, but can't be helped. I ring bells down slowly one at a time to sound a little like tolling. Then ring up the Tenor ready for tolling tomorrow. One ringer arrives, so at least we can tell him there's no practice and he doesn't hang around fruitlessly waiting for everyone else.

Friday 9th September

09:00 - Binsted to meet with the builders manager to explain what is required. Get up the tower to raise the Union flag to half mast. The scaffolders have only just started work, so it turns out it would not have affected practice vesterday, but due to the sad events that is pretty much irrelevant. Speak to the scaffolders to ensure I have access to toll the Tenor bell at 12:00. Have the opportunity to speak with Cathie and Matt to explain and agree what we are doing.

To mark the announcement of the death of HM Queen Elizabeth the guidance is to ring for one hour, stopping at 13:00.

12:00 - Anita & Kathy go to Bentley to toll the tenor at, no significant problems here, as the bell could be rung normally. It is rung slowly, open, not muffled for 1/2 hour. This is so that the tolling stops before the wedding guests arrive.

11.45 - Binsted to toll the tenor bell. Not so easy here as the scaffolding means the ringing room can't be used. I thought about ringing the bell by pushing the wheel, decided this was too dangerous on my own. So decided to try to ring from the clock room, fully muffled the clapper and fitted a length of old rope. With a coil of rope on the floor, I put a piece of rag into the rope to show roughly where the sally would be as there wasn't one, and rang the bell wearing thick gloves as there was no sally or tail end, but still got two huge blisters. It was very difficult due to the low ceiling and unsuitable rope configuration but I managed to toll for one hour. With hindsight this was more difficult than ringing on the wheel would have been!

Check the guidance on-line, it has been updated, not as confusing or contradictory now. Can't understand why they are continuing with the D-Day business, surely while editing the guidance they could have helped hugely by putting the actual dates in instead? 14:30 - Newton Valence to ring a muffled quarter peal in memoriam HM Queen Elizabeth.

Jacci from Binsted rang a quarter peal at Seale. Kaye & Brenda from Binsted helped at Frensham with one hour muffled ringing and Simon helped with ringing at Grimsby.

Saturday 10th September

11:00 – Binsted. Flag raised to full mast at 11:00 to mark the start of the proclamation of King Charles III

Simon rang in a quarter peals at Alton All Saints and Blackmoor.

Sunday 11th September

Ring a Quarter peal at Bentley for the proclamation of King Charles III, prior to 11:00 service.

13:00 – Binsted. Flag lowered to half mast again at 13:00 to mark the end of the proclamation of King Charles III.

Simon rang in a quarter at Alton St Lawrence.

Monday 12th September

Email from Simon. Matt has approved a practice at Bentley on Thursday, bells to be fully muffled as per the guidance.

Bramshott practice cancelled.

Wednesday 14th September

Simon lends me his key to Bentley tower, go to Bentley to fully muffle the bells using Binsted's muffles as Bentley don't have any.

Email everyone to confirm practice tomorrow approved & is going ahead.

19:00 – Selborne. Muffled quarter peal in memoriam HM Queen Elizabeth, with Anita & Marie from Binsted.

Thursday 15th September

Practice at Bentley goes ahead, a good turnout and some good ringing. Matt calls in to see us which is much appreciated by all.

Friday 16th September

19:30 - St. Mary's Liss to help their learners ringing muffled in memoriam.

Saturday 17th September

09:00 - St Peter's Liss, bell maintenance work.

15:30 – Chawton, to ring a half peal in memoriam. Half peal because one of the band didn't want to ring a full peal. Anita also took part.

Sunday 18th September

General ringing before 09:00 service at Bentley. Ross, Bryony, Richard & Simon from Bentley and Jacci, Kathy & Anita from Binsted also rang.

Simon rang in a quarter at Holybourne.

Monday 19th September

Ringing required for one hour prior to the funeral of HM Queen Elizabeth II at 11:00. Organise a quarter peal at Bentley, starting at 09:45. This is to allow those who wish to to get home to watch the funeral on TV. Also means I should be able to toll the Tenor at Binsted just before 11:00

After a false start the quarter is successful. Simon, Brenda, Marie & Anita also rang. But the re-start means we finish later than expected.Dash up to Binsted in time to toll the Tenor for 10 minutes up to 11:00. Even harder this time as decided to try chiming the bell. Even less successful than previous tolling! But at least managed to toll the bell.

Jacci helped with ringing at Seale, and Kaye at Frensham.

Tuesday 20th September

08:00 – Binsted. Take the flag down, at the end of the period of official mourning. Decide not to leave flag up, raised to full mast, mainly to ensure the builders can get on with their work uninterrupted. The builders have removed the disused clock weight shaft from the ringing room, discovering a large hole in the floor, asked by Churchwardens to have a look and see how bad it is - not good!

11:00 – Bentley, to remove the muffles, and tighten a loose stay.

Phew! Hopefully can get back to some semblance of normality now! Jack Regin
