Benefice Letter

I love reading a good crime thriller, especially if it comes out of Scandinavia. There is a theory that the safest countries have the darkest thrillers, as the contrast between fantasy and real life is greater. In the UK, hundreds of thousands tune in to watch the season finale of series like "Happy Valley" and "Line of Duty". Perhaps, like me, they enjoy the delicious anticipation of the evil genius finally being unmasked against incredible odds, and the characters we have grown to love, having the chance of living a happy life (although that would make poor TV!).

This strong sense of justice runs through all of us. In prison, huge problems can arise from someone feeling that they didn't get what they felt they deserved and were "violated". The usual response is often violence. The irony that they themselves are perpetrators of injustice against their victims, is often ignored or not even considered.

In the Old Testament, the Law enshrined the concept of proportionate retaliation. Famously described as "an eye for and eye, tooth for a tooth". The problem with this is that it leaves a society scarred and lessened, by the strict application of justice. As someone said, "in the land of the blind, the one-eyed man is king."

However, alongside justice, the Bible also attributes mercy as a key aspect of God's character. Mercy sounds a much weaker word in English, yet it is central to the good news of God.

"Then Jesus told this story to some who had great self-confidence and scorned everyone else:

"Two men went to the Temple to pray. One was a Pharisee, and the other was a dishonest tax collector. The proud Pharisee stood by himself and prayed this prayer: "I thank you, God, that I am not a sinner like everyone else, especially like that tax collector over there! For I never cheat, I don't sin, I don't commit adultery, I fast twice a week, and I give a tenth of my income"

But the tax collector stood at a distance and dared not even lift his eyes to heaven as he prayed. Instead, he beat his chest in sorrow, saying, "O God, be merciful to me, for I am a sinner." I tell you the truth, this sinner, not the Pharisee, returned home justified before God. For the proud will be humbled, but the humble will be honoured." Luke 18:9-14

We all need mercy. If we were to receive the just desserts for all our wrongdoing, and Jesus includes our thoughts and fantasies in the list, what would anyone of us have left? Mercy cannot be coerced from God. It is his to dispense as he wills and he promises that he will not despise a broken heart. Genuine remorse for wrong done, or good left undone, is the precondition for mercy to be granted. The Bible calls this repentance and results in a turning around of our lives.

Mercy is a word we rarely hear outside of church services, but I think we need to treasure it more than we do. As the Roman Catholic philosopher Peter Kreeft says, "It is mercy, not justice, or courage or even heroism, that alone can defeat evil." God's mercy promises our slates being wiped clean and a chance to start again (and again). Without it, we face cold unbending justice or vicious greedy injustice without any hope that things can be any better.

In this season of Lent, may the God of mercy draw close to you and breathe his promise of a new life into you, as you examine your hearts and prepare to contemplate in the Easter story. The price God paid to set the guilty free.

Youth & Children at BenBinFro

February has been a brilliant month in the world of youth and children's work in our benefice. Starting from the beginning of the month, our children learned about the story of God choosing David to be king at Children's Church. They realised that it was easy to describe a person by looking at their appearance, but couldn't tell what they were like on the inside from just a picture. David was the youngest brother, and didn't look very kingly from the outside, but God saw him differently and chose him to be king. God still sees everyone differently, and knows what everyone is like on the inside and thinks we're very special. We made medals to show how much God values each one of us – there was glitter everywhere!

With our older teenagers, we toned down the glitter and took them to a church in Guildford to get away from the village bubble, to worship together and experience 'church' in a different way. They loved meeting new people and feeling like grown-ups!

At four:twelve on the 10th February, we spent the evening wrestling with newspapers to build bridges, seeing how much weight each one could hold. It was a test of creativity and engineering! On the 24th February, it happened to be the same week as Shrove Tuesday, so naturally we spent the evening making and eating pancakes, all while learning about key events in Jesus' life as we head towards Easter.

On Fridays, I spend my lunchtimes with the year 6s at Bentley school. This month they have been obsessed with a game called Yetti. 'Yetti' means 'seven', and funnily enough there are seven ways you can use the cards in the box from silly games to creating meaningful conversations about faith. It's been so fun to try a different game each week and have conversations that wouldn't normally happen. After half term, I started spending my Thursday lunchtimes with year 5 and 6 at Binsted school and I'm really looking forward to seeing how these lunchtime groups grow and develop.

February is also the month of our annual weekend away to the Isle of Wight. On the 11th-13th Feb we took 24 young people from across BenBinFro, Alton, Four Marks, and Odiham to Ryde to have a whole lot of fun together. We watched films, played lots of games, went swimming and built our own catapults! In amongst the fun, we also spent lots of time learning about our faith and worshiping God. We looked at the phrase 'Belong, Believe, Behave' in our sessions – learning what it means to become a follower of Jesus and a member of the church family. We're looking forward to next year!

William John Retallack

It is with great sadness that we announce that William John Retallack, a well-known Binsted farmer, died peacefully on the 1st February 2023.

John was born in Binsted to the Retallack farming family in 1944. John lived in Binsted all his life farming at Place Farm, growing hops, vegetables and latterly sheep farming and cereal crops. Although John never married, he was a much-loved brother, uncle and great uncle. John served on the Binsted Parish Council for over 50 years and was also a stalwart committee member of Binsted Growmore Club, serving in several offices for the Club over 50 years. In his youth John was a talented cricketer, turning his arm for the Alton and Binsted Clubs as well as enjoying playing football for Binsted. John's great sporting enthusiasm was horse racing, about which he was very knowledgeable.

After a fall on the farm in August last year John was moved to a nursing home, where his quiet dignified demeanour was noted by his carers. Sadly John passed away on his 79th birthday.





What's happening in Bentley and Binsted over the next few months?

The best part of local village life is when people come together to organise community events. Over the next few months, our parishes have some great events coming up - a nice mix of informal fun ones, and more formal occasions.

Annual Assemblies and Parish Meetings in April: Parish councils must by law hold an annual assembly / parish meeting, to give all residents the chance to have their say about parish matters and to hear what's happening in local organisations. All parish residents are invited to attend. This is a legacy from the Middle Ages, when local councils didn't exist, and local decisions were made by meetings of the whole community. Full details of these meetings will be in the next Parish Magazine, but save the dates, which are:

Binsted's Annual Parish Meeting:

at the Wickham Institute, Wednesday 5th April, 7.00 pm

Bentley's Annual Assembly:

at the Bentley Memorial Hall, Tuesday 25th April, 7.30 pm.

Celebrating the Coronation: As this edition of the parish magazine goes to press, local Coronation plans are starting to take shape. Do keep us posted on your community's plans, especially if you're getting involved in the Coronation 'Big Lunch' on Sunday 7th May, or in the 'Big Help Out' on Monday 8th May. In Binsted, the parish council is hosting an afternoon tea event on Sunday 7th May at the Recreation Ground, with a Brass Band.

July's the time for summer Fetes: Binsted's Fete is on Saturday 8th July; and Bentley's is on Saturday July 17th.

We're also gearing up for local elections. By law, District Councillors and Parish Councils are subject to elections every four years. This year, it's East Hampshire's turn, with elections due to be held on Thursday 4th May. It's obviously important to have councillors that properly represent the demographics of the local area, and this is a good opportunity to take stock. Many parishes across the UK struggle to recruit councillors, and Bentley and Binsted count ourselves fortunate to currently have a committed cohort of councillors, who we hope will continue in post to provide continuity and experience. However, new blood is always welcome, and if you want to stand to be a councillor, now is a good time to consider whether you could be interested to join the local parish councils' teams.

Parish Councils are places where ordinary people come together to make decisions about issues they care about: improving local services, protecting the environment, keeping facilities in good repair, and so forth. Unlike District Councillors, parish councillors have no party affiliation - they're simply (unpaid) volunteers, willing to serve their community. Our topics rarely make headline news, but the discussions feel human and grounded.

It may be stating the obvious, but it's only when parish councils have sufficient capacity that they can take forward more exciting new projects or tackle the more taxing projects.

So we'd love your help and involvement. Let us know if you're interested in becoming a Parish Councillor, or in helping out with a specific Project, Working Party or with communications - for example, we currently need help with social media and school liaison.

Parish Councils aren't just scenes from The Vicar of Dibley or Handforth Parish Council Zoom meetings. They're an opportunity to have your voice heard and shape YOUR area. Don't worry if you don't know what's expected by the role - we can send you on training courses (paid for by us, of course). It's always important that the councillors elected fairly represent the local demographic, so we always need people just like you.

Local parish areas in East Hampshire are based on civic boundaries, not Anglican church ones. District, parish and town councils are subject to elections every 4 years and all Councillors will need to go through an election process in order to stay in council after May 2023. This year polling day is on **Thursday 4th May 2023.**

Standing to be a Councillor

- 1. Get a nomination form
 - Please contact your parish clerk (details below) or EHDC for your nomination form.
- 2. Complete your nomination form

Including your personal details and two people supporting your application. There are some criteria that must be met:

- ✓ Aged 18 or over
- ✓ A British citizen

You must comply with **one** of the following:

- Registered as a local government elector for the parish
- Occupied for the whole of 12 months preceding the date of nomination as owner or tenant of land in the parish
- Your principal or only place of work during the last 12 months has been in the parish
- Resided in the parish or within 4.8km (3 miles) of it

However, you should **not** have been:

- Declared bankrupt
- A paid employee of the council that you are standing for
- Convicted of a crime and sentenced to a term of imprisonment of not less than three months within five years before the day of the election
- Disqualified under any enactment relating to corrupt or illegal practices

3. Return your completed application form Don't forget to send your form back by the deadline time and date!

OVER THE GARDEN WALL

A selection of plant studies, drawings and paintings, by renowned landscape artist **W H Allen** from the collection in the care of Hampshire Cultural Trust.

Allen (1863–1943) is best known for his evocative watercolours and chalk and pencil sketches of the landscapes, traditions and people of West Surrey and North-east Hampshire.

As with most professional artists his sketchbook was never far from his side. For a landscape artist, developing the skill instantly to capture changes in the natural world, from season to season, often minute to minute, was essential. These studies allowed Allen to create a body of work that he could reference, and seek inspiration from, when developing the landscape paintings he is most famous for.

While these studies aren't intended to be detailed botanical illustrations, they do successfully convey the character and appearance of plants you may well have glimpsed over a garden wall, as you strolled the quiet country lanes of Hampshire in the early 1900s.

Our Gambian Friends

We have a very special school 'twin' with Sitahuma School in The Gambia. Like us, they are a village school but in very different circumstances, both geographically and financially. Over the last five years we have linked in learning and our pupils have benefitted hugely from this partnership work. We are very excited that Mrs Pinchess, our Headteacher, is going back to visit The Gambia at February half term. She will deliver resources and donations from our school to theirs and will find out how they are. Each Bentley pupil has created a special postcard to be given to a child at the school to share our ideas and offer friendship.

We have learnt about The Gambia as a country and think about what is the same and different between our two village schools. Our children were shocked to hear that many children in the village schools, like Sitahuma, may only have one meal a day and that is their school lunch. Sadly, funding for these school lunches can be removed or run out and this means some children are hungry. We found out that one school lunch in Bentley costs £2.80 but this amount will feed a child in The Gambia for 30 meals (a whole half term of 6 weeks)!

Our pupils really want to help their friends in The Gambia and we have some exciting plans this term to raise funds and to deepen our connection with Sitahuma School. Our main focus is on forging links with others and finding out more about the world we live in. Staff have noted children developing empathy and being more aware of how lucky they are through this important work.

What's happening locally about sewage?

It's 33 years since the charity 'Surfers Against Sewage' (SAS) started campaigning for improved water quality. Yet, despite excellent campaigns by SAS, the Rivers Trusts, anglers and environmentalists, the pollution of England's beaches and rivers continues to rise.

Shockingly, there's not a single river in the whole of England that's in good overall environmental health. The sheer volume of sewage and agricultural run-off entering our waters means the UK now ranks last amongst EU countries for bathing water quality. A top UK professional windsurfer cited frequent gastroenteritis and other water-acquired infections as the reason for her recent move from Hayling Island to Spain. Wildlife is suffering too.

The River Wey isn't faring well. Spills occurred at all its local pumping stations last year. The Northern Wey, a rare chalk stream, is in worse condition than its Southern counterpart. Its invertebrate life is seriously damaged. The Bentley plant, which also treats sewage from Binsted and Froyle, caused 129 spills in 2022, with raw sewage discharging for a total of 804 hours. A new surge tank will be operational at Bentley by May, but this won't resolve all the plant's pollution problems, and the river authorities also recognise a need to improve the local catchment map. Improperly managed septic tanks also cause significant pollution locally.

What can we do about it?

- (1) Be vigilant. No-one wants to spend their spare time fighting to fix a problem that simply shouldn't exist in the first place. However, until the sewage crisis is resolved, we must all be vigilant and speak up for our beautiful local rivers. Check what's happening on Thames Water's real-time map www.thameswater.co.uk/edm-map, particularly if any storm overflows occur in dry weather. Suspiciously, 'storm overflow' discharges do occur in prolonged dry spells. As I write this (25 January), Selborne's sewage treatment plant is amongst 13 Thames Water plants discharging after 10 days of dry weather (see the double 'exclamation marks' on the map in Figure 1 below.)
- (2) Switch to low-phosphate dishwasher tablets. 55% of rivers fail water quality because of excessive phosphate levels. Eutrophication, caused by high levels of phosphates and nitrates in wastewater effluents, results in low oxygen levels, algal blooms and harm to fish and wildlife. Most mains sewage treatment plants don't remove sufficient phosphate and many septic tank systems don't remove any phosphates. Check the label when you buy dishwasher tablets a phosphate level under 1.6% is considered low and many eco-friendly brands are phosphate free. Eco-friendly dishwasher tablets are much more powerful at cleaning than they used to be.
- (3) If you have a septic tank, check that you're not polluting the waterways, by getting your system regularly serviced, and calling in an expert if your system starts smelling or causing foam or scum. Hampshire's 'Septic Smart' project (www.hiwwt.org.uk/septicsmart) has more info.
- (4) Join a local citizen science water quality monitoring initiative. We hope a new citizen science initiative will be getting underway on our local section of the Northern Wey in 2023. If you'd like to get involved with this, email binstedeconetwork@gmail.com and we'll put you in touch with the people involved. Or join an already-active local group: In Guildford, the 'Water Rangers' group (www.facebook.com/ waterrangers/ for details) works collaboratively with the River Wey Trust and other environmental groups to test local water and fill data gaps. In Alton, the 'Alton & Villages Local Action for Nature' group (part of Alton Climate Action Network) works with the Wildlife Trust to protect the River Way in Alton and runs monthly 'Riverfly' testing sessions (email AltonClimateNetwork@Gmail.com for details.)

(5) Write to your MP. This is a problem which needs government action. There's widespread concern about several issues, including: that the Environment Agency has too few staff to properly investigate and prosecute pollution incidents; that water companies continue to pay large bonuses to company bosses and high dividends to shareholders, expecting to fund infrastructure improvements from customers' household bills; and that politicians failed to strengthen targets for river pollution and in December moved the original 2027 'clean-up' deadline for agricultural and sewage pollution back to 2063.

Blackthorn

William Cobbett, famous son of Farnham, wrote this:

It is a memorable fact that there is always, that is every year of our lives, a spell of cold and angry weather just at the time this hardy little tree is in bloom. The country people call it the Black Thorn winter and thus it has been called, I dare say, by all the inhabitants of this island, from generation to generation, for a thousand years.

The Woodlands, 1825

Now, in this age of meteorological uncertainty, it's less easy to predict whether and when we may have a blackthorn winter, and the *prunus spinosa* may become as confused as we are as to when it should bloom. But bloom it must, and brighten up the drive from Farnham to Four Marks.

It's a delightful mixture of sweetness and menace. You might be tempted to sink your face into that wonderful fragrant blossom, but watch out for the vicious thorns. There are good examples of self-grown blackthorn in the Bentley butterfly meadow, nurtured there by the Conservationists because of the trees' attraction for some of our rarer butterflies. And go back again in autumn to collect the sloes, after all it seems we can't leave a good gin to its own devices these days!

There in the butterfly meadow you can see that an individual tree can grow to four metres, but it is more usual to find them living alongside hawthorn and dog rose in most country hedgerows. Order mixed whips from a nursery, as we did for the new hedges at Blacknest and these three are bound to be included. Just as oaks may be the most beneficial tree for biodiversity, so blackthorn bushes offer sustenance in the hard times of early winter, when birds need to be building up their sugar reserves, as well as offer guardianship for the small creatures who live close to the ground, and also nestling those butterfly eggs.

There is one, particular use of a blackthorn bush that I have never personally come across, but I believe to be true, and that is that shrikes will impale their prey – small rodents, reptiles and beetles – on the thorns, leading to their alternative name of butcher birds. Please let me know at binstedtrees@gmail.com if you ever come across such a sight.

And humans have weaponised blackthorn as well, as the boughs have been found to be most useful as an offensive weapon. *Sail eille* in Irish, shillelagh to you and me. The wood is dense and heavy. A piece cut just below the root will have the form of a knobbly handle, or a club head when required. Though still quite fragile as cut, the implement could be cured by burying it in a dung heap, then placing it in the chimney. Nice! Little wonder then that even ghosts and goblins were reputed to be warded off by them. Even less that Harry Potter should have chosen it as material for his wand.

There's plenty of magic in them thar woodlands, and nowhere more so than around the thorny plum bush, *Prunus spinosa*.

Luminosa's Spring Concert is a Message of Light and Hope

Sergei Rachmaninov's All-Night Vigil is a haunting cornerstone of the choral repertoire, and an overwhelming listening experience. Alton-based choir, Luminosa, is delighted to be performing this work, along with Morten Lauridsen's Lux Aeterna, and Michael Higgins' O Salutaris Hostia at All Saints Church, Odiham on Saturday March 25th at 7pm.

The All-Night Vigil is an incredible work, and arguably Rachmaninov's finest achievement, written within



two weeks during the First World War in early 1915. He was looking to write something more introspective than usual: not for liturgical use but as a war benefit concert.

The All-Night Vigil asks the congregation to contemplate the light of the coming dawn as emblematic of Christ's resurrection. Rachmaninov followed the church's tradition of basing ten of the fifteen sections on chants, with the remaining five being more free form. In particular, the 'Kiev' chant resonates most poignantly today. The whole work is full of exquisite harmonies, ranging from top soprano to bottom bass, full of light and shade: a radiant masterpiece.

The first performance took place in March 1915, when it was warmly received by critics and audiences alike. However, the Russian Revolution of 1917, and the rise of the Soviet Union, led to government condemnation of sacred music. Consequently, no other composition marks the end of an era so completely as this quiet, reflective and deeply moving work.

The concert will also feature Luminosa Chamber Voices who will perform Morten Lauridsen's *Lux Aeterna*. Written in 1997 following the death of his mother, this beautiful work explores music's power to preserve and remember, and the depth of human capacity to love. Lauridsen presents sacred Latin texts in five movements with luminous shifting harmonies, perfectly expressing a timeless sense of serenity.

Michael Higgins will provide sensitive, atmospheric piano accompaniment. Luminosa is also honoured to be performing his exquisite *O Salutaris Hostia* (an arrangement of Elgar's *Nimrod*) which he composed during the Covid lockdown.

Conducted by their dynamic artistic director, Rebekah Abbott, Luminosa will perform this exceptional music with the textual variety and sustained luxuriance of sound for which Luminosa is now well known. There will be also a surprise addition to the concert experience which will enhance the evening's message of hope and light.

If you love choral music and appreciate compositions that lift you from the mundane, you should not miss Luminosa's spring concert at the beautiful All Saints Church, Odiham on Saturday March 25th at 7pm.
