Benefice Letter

100 years ago this month the German mark lost so much of it's value, that 1 mark was worth 1000 US cents. The hyperinflation that Germany suffered in 1923, where a wheelbarrow full of notes was worth more than what it carried, utterly devastated the country. Under the terms of the Treaty of Versailles, the main industrial areas, the Saar and Rhineland, were occupied by France and their production was used to rebuild that former enemy. The Peace realised the dreams of many nations to have self -determination and independence, but within 10 years all were under different kinds of authoritarian regimes. The roots of democracy were too thin and the structures of government were too weak to stand, under the enormous pressures to rebuild.

As a species, we are very prone to resort to war, despite its enormous cost, to seek to resolve our issues or greed. Conversely, we fail to devote similar amounts of money to building peace. The Marshall Aid plan after the Second World War, is perhaps, an exception. But due to politics, this largess was limited to the countries of Western Europe. The economic miracle of how Germany emerged after the Second World War compared to after the First, is well documented.

If the peace is not built securely, we are sowing a bitter harvest that will be reaped in due course. Germany of the 1920's became embittered and angry and a message of "being stabbed in the back" and "victims of an international conspiracy" used anti-Semitic tropes to create the atmosphere in which the Nazi party was to be born and thrive. With deadly, monstrous, consequences.

The war in the Ukraine continues, with unrelenting devastation and destruction visited on the Ukrainian people and their culture and nation. Russia too, is suffering an unimaginably high death toll among its young fighting men, as well as, increasingly, attacks and sabotage on key infrastructure within Russian borders. There is no sense to this aggression, no victory to be won over controlling devastated, flattened cities and homes. Evil can only destroy, never create.

We pray for a swift end to this war and for peace to reign once more. True peace though, is not just the end to hostilities, it is the building of a just and thriving society. Where the displaced are homed, the injured treated, where loss can begin to be accepted in a caring and supportive environment. It is where children can go to school and play outside safely. It is the sharing of meals,

lives, homes with those we love and those in need. It is everything in its right place and all working together so that all may thrive. These are just some of the rich meanings of the Hebrew word "Shalom" which translates so weakly as "peace" in English.

In Jesus's first sermon recorded in Luke 4, he takes as his text Isaiah 61 "The Spirit of the Sovereign LORD is upon me, because the LORD has appointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to comfort the broken hearted and to announce that captives will be released and prisoners will be freed. He has sent me to tell those who mourn that the time of the LORD's favour has come."

Jesus is the Prince of Peace. May he give us wisdom to not just fight injustice, but to truly build peace. In the Ukraine, in our society and in our homes. For blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called the children of God. May Shalom fill you and bless you always.

I took 7 young people and 2 other leaders to Winchester Cathedral to sleep out in cardboard boxes to raise money for Trinity Winchester, a charity that combats homelessness. We had an amazing evening enjoying the food, entertainment and especially building our shelters for the night. Thank you to everyone for your kind donations of cardboard, tape and tarpaulins, and especially thanks to those who donated directly to Trinity Winchester. We have raised over £1100 and this money will go a long way.



It was a dry night, a little windy, but the cathedral itself sheltered us from the wind! After a bedtime story we got ourselves ready for bed. Our shelter was like a little house with lots of rooms; the 9 of us spread between 6 'rooms'. The tarpaulin over us created a roof which basically created corridors between the boxes – that was especially helpful for us to store our things and keep them dry! With over 200 people sleeping out overall, there were a few snorers, but that didn't bother us. Most of us woke up with the birds singing and the sun rising at around 5:30am, and I even had to wake some of our group up as we packed up around them because they were sleeping so soundly! We had a brilliant time and you can see some photos above. Well done everyone!

In June we're excited for Plugged In – our brand-new trial youth group using digital tools to engage our young people. We are diving into the Bible and then creating games, characters or scenes on a computer in response to the story. Coding is a huge industry so not only will we be learning bible stories, but we'll also be building on IT skills which are vital in today's world. This is running through the summer term but hopefully we'll be able to continue the group in September!

I'm looking forward to seeing you all at various groups through June.

And I was there...



Like many local residents, I watched the coronation ceremony and thoroughly enjoyed hearing King Charles III uttering his vows, Queen Camilla looking and sounding resolute and the Archbishop of Canterbury

vigorous and impassioned both in delivery and reflections. It all took me back 70 years when I was lucky enough to be present at Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation.

I had been chosen by my school's Cadet Corps to represent them. I travelled to London the day before, stayed overnight in an Army Barracks, was awakened at 4am, and set off at 6am armed with sandwiches and water for the day. We were marched in our cadet uniform to our position standing at the front of the Victoria Memorial opposite Buckingham Palace. We were not allowed to leave our position all day, except for toilet visits. We cheered when the Oueen and the royal procession went past, but we had to wait all day for the return of the procession. We stood in our uniforms.

coping with the rain and not a lot to watch because it was all happening away in Westminster Abbey.

Food was difficult to find because the country was still on rationing (when I went to university in October 1955, I had to take my Ration book, although this practice was ended in November of that year.) But I did enjoy the day – what a terrific experience especially during that rather drat immediate post-war period.

I have many times looked for a familiar face on black and white television, but the cameras were set on more interesting things than cadets in army uniform. What a splendid day and I was privileged to be a part of it. Yes, I was there...!



Update from Bentley Parish Council



On the evening of Tuesday 25th April, we held our Annual Parish Assembly at the Bentley Memorial Hall. An enjoyable and well attended evening and opportunity to hear all about the activities of the many clubs, groups, and institutions in the parish. To begin the meeting, I gave a brief report about the activities of Bentley Parish Council. We also received reports from district councillor David Ashcroft and county councillor Mark Kemp-Gee and we would like to thank both David and Mark for their help and support on matters affecting the parish over the past year. I also made a special presentation to our retiring district councillor, Ken Carter, who has represented us valiantly during the past sixteen years. Ken, thanks for all the time and energy you have given to supporting Bentley.

To conclude the parish council's contribution to the evening, Jenny Turner gave an update on preparations for the King's Coronation this weekend, which will include a tea party at the Memorial Hall on the afternoon of the Coronation, and on Sunday, The Coronation Big Lunch at the Recreation Ground, featuring a cricket match with the newly formed Bentley Archers cricketers in action. In addition, a new bench to commemorate the event is ready for installation on Carter's Meadow and coronation mugs from the Parish Council were donated to all pupils at Bentley School. We were also informed that St Mary's Church bells will be ringing out on the morning of the Coronation.

And it was to the Church that we received our first report, from the Reverend Matt Boyes, our new vicar; a very accomplished debut speech followed. Matt gave an outline of the new benefice structure, and he included a warm welcome to residents and friends to attend Sunday morning services at St Mary's.

Following Matt we heard from Becky Miffling, acting head at Bentley School. Becky, who

has taken charge this term following the departure of Katy Pinchess, gave us a run down of the activities and achievements of the school, which are a great testament to the efforts of the staff, Katy and Becky of the past few years. Becky also announced the arrival of the incoming head, Vicki Hallett, starting at the beginning of the next academic year,

After the school report, we received a report from Carmella Reece of the 2nd Bentley Scout Group. As always, an impressive palmarès of achievements during the past year and a taste of the activities and expeditions to come later this year. In addition to the well established sections in the group a new junior section, Squirrels, has been added for 4-7 year olds. We wish the Scouts continued success.

Following learning about what the youth of Bentley have been up to, we next heard from Linda Fuller, who gave us a brief overview of the activities of the Phoenix ladies. The group have a healthy membership and a full, monthly programme of events.

Next Hugh Chissell rose to tell us about last year's Bentley Fete and Flower Show, which was back after missing a couple of years. A hugely successful event as usual, with excellent weather to match. Hugh went onto report on last November's Bentley Bonfire Night; another great success with both impressive fireworks display and themed bonfire.

Trish Cardy followed to tell us about the activities of the Gardening Club. Although membership had dropped during lockdowns, over the past year it has increased to 25 with some returnees and, encouragingly, a number of new members, keen to learn from the experienced old hands!

Continuing the gardening theme, Bill Whitfield gave us a humorous account of exploits at the allotments. All allotments are allocated, and Bill informed us that the fashion for re-wilding, prevalent recently, has been suspended in favour of more traditional horticultural husbandry.

Our last contribution was from Jim Hannon of Bentley Archers Cricket and Sports Club, who told us about progress in forming the new cricket club. The Archers will be putting out a senior team against local clubs in the area this season as we begin work to improve playing facilities at the Recreation Ground.

So, on behalf of the Parish Council I would like to thank all who attended, especially our speakers. 

Maintaining Binsted's Rights of Way network

The Binsted Rights of Way volunteer team met up with our HCC Community Ranger Megan at the Parish Council offices on 21st April, when she finally delivered the Path Warden training that we have long been waiting for. It was great to meet Megan in person and to take the opportunity to ask the many questions that arise when we are inspecting the paths of this parish and others. We also took the opportunity to go for a walk along some Rights of Way close to the Binsted Pavilion, to identify the kinds of issue we should be looking out for, and which ones we can solve ourselves.

In fact, we had just received an email earlier that week, to the address highlighted at the foot of the page, which identified a problem on a local walking route, so we decided to take Megan down to see it. It is Wyck Lane, which is the track that turns right off Church Street as you are heading South from Binsted. It starts as a made track, going past some cottages, but rapidly descends into an extremely muddy track going down to the two ponds at the bottom of the slope – it does continue quite a distance, all the way to Wyck, but we stopped at the ponds. It really is quite a beautiful spot (as long as you don't look at the track itself!), and the

route is definitely an important link to several local footpaths which are official Rights of Way. But looking at this track on the Ordnance Survey map, it is shown by green dots, which makes it an "Other route with public access", which does not fall under the jurisdiction of HCC Countryside Services. We took several photos of the quagmire and after a short discussion, decided that the Hampshire Highways department would be our next port of call. Our report has now been submitted and we are awaiting a response watch this space for updates.

Last month, I mentioned the major project to resurface parts of Bridleway 62 between its eastern end in Frith End and the end of the Straits Inclosure. The Binsted volunteers were asked to work with Megan to install tree protectors on the Friday before work was due to start. This turned out to be a major effort, involving 8 metre long, one metre diameter plastic water pipes. These had to be cut in three by hand and then in half lengthwise (fortunately with a chainsaw!) in order to form the half pipes that would protect the trees. Then, these had to be transported manually to the site of those very privileged trees and secured to them using wire. By the end of the day, we were wet and muddy, rather weary, but still smiling - a great team effort - and boy, did we sleep well that night! It was very gratifying that, right on cue, the

following Monday morning saw the heavy plant arriving at the eastern end of the Bridleway – the contractors have indeed started the resurfacing work.

The Binsted volunteers are regularly inspecting the parish's paths, but if you would like to report a problem on any of the Binsted Rights of Way, whether it is a fallen tree, a broken stile, a collapsed fingerpost or simply some overgrown vegetation, you can do so online on the Hampshire "Report a problem on a right of way" page - this requires you to create an account and log in to the site first. Alternatively, you can use the volunteer team's own email address to do so - it is BinstedRoW@gmail.com. One final way of reporting a Rights of Way problem is to do so on the Binsted Community Facebook group. The volunteer team will try to identify problems reported there and deal with them promptly if we can in all cases, please give as much location information as possible.

Bentley Primary School has its own wood at the north end of the playground. What an asset!

It's just half an acre but it harbours more than 20 varieties of trees; broadleaf and conifer, tall and short. I know this because I was invited to help take stock of what they have there. I reckon the oldest specimens must be at least 50 years old. They didn't all turn up there by accident. So the school has acknowledged, for at least that long, that knowing trees is important to a child's development. I want to talk in particular about the maples we found. There is the 'marmite tree', the sycamore, you love 'em for the helicopters (technically samaras) or you hate 'em for how easily they spring up and how quickly they grow. There is also the Norway maple, an altogether more stately version of the sycamore, with its distinctive corrugated bark that the poet John Clare described as "ribb'd like corduroy". But the stand-out maple here is the only true native to Britain, the field maple, Acer campestre.

They share the same distinctive maple shape to their leaves, but not so large, and more rounded. They turn a lovely golden brown in the autumn.

The samaras perform the same function as they do for other acers, but are half the size of a sycamore. Nevertheless they have efficiently populated the floor of the school's wood.

They are not uncommon round here, as single trees or in hedges, but they don't get the attention they deserve, and were once wont to have. Field maples were much loved, particularly for their wood. A harp made from maple was found in a Saxon barrow at Taplow in Buckinghamshire, and another, wrapped in a sealskin bag, was discovered among the treasures of the Sutton Hoo ship burial in Suffolk. At that time campestre was the only show in town.

The name 'maple' has an interesting etymology. Most of our trees have Saxon names (the Normans, of course, doubled the vocabulary of the English language, whilst seemingly ignoring the trees altogether). But 'maple' undoubtedly derives from the old British or Welsh word 'mapwl' meaning a knob in the middle of something...No, bear with...It refers to the knotty growth on the trunk of the tree that arborists call the bruscum . These were highly valued in Roman times and in the middle ages for making bowls and tables, and still fetch amazing prices when they come to auction. So the tree got named after its most valuable asset.

Incidentally, the Saxon word was probably close to the Dutch word 'maeser' meaning a knot of the maple wood, and found its way into our language as mazer for a large drinking bowl for posh banquets, but also, measles, because the rash resembles the markings on the tree's trunk.

My favourite folkloric link, though, has to be to the custom, reported by one Richard Folkard (isn't it funny how often people have names that tell you something about them), that in parts of the country, as close as East Grinstead, there was the belief that the field maple would bless children with longevity if they were passed through the branches.

Should you observe families, in the school wood, and behaving bizarrely, then this might be the explanation!

Unfortunately, some additional work has had to be done and some of the costs have increased, so our fundraising target has increased to $\underline{\pounds40,000}$, leaving us $\pounds30,000$ still to raise.

Our church is quite a landmark, the highest point in Hampshire, a grade 1 listed building built in 12th Century, and it belongs to us all.

Every week the scaffolding is up, the more expensive the project becomes, so we are progressing as fast as we can to complete the work. We hope to remove the scaffolding and the safety enclosure by the end of June, returning the graveyard back to normal for the first time in over a year.






