Benefice Letter

"What is truth?" is the famous question Pontius Pilate asks of Jesus during his trial and before condemning Jesus to death. Jesus doesn't answer and we'll come back to why in a bit. Truth is something that seems very slippery in our culture. Prince Harry has become known for speaking what he calls "my truth". Is truth an opinion dressed up in formal clothes? Or is it something more tangible and real?

Marcus Aurelius, a Roman Emperor after the time of Pilate wrote his "Meditations" which are a description of his view of the world and a brilliant exploration of what we call Stoic philosophy. He writes, "Everything we hear is an opinion, not a fact. Everything we see is a perspective, not the truth." Perhaps the Duke of Sussex has been reading him, or then again, perhaps not!

Scientific truth is something that explains the phenomena that we see around us. It helps us to progress and make new discoveries and inventions. But all scientific knowledge is partial. It is the best explanation we can give until we have more evidence. For example, the age of the universe was calculated from what we could see of it. The James Webb telescope is able to see further into space than ever before and we have discovered thousands of new galaxies and is forcing us to revise our understanding of the origins and age of the universe.

Is all truth like this? Is it personal opinion, or the best guess until something better comes along? Can we speak of something being the truth at all? Some philosophers conclude we can't. Yet without truth we are adrift in an ocean of ideas without any way to say even what is real or not. As Betrand Russell concluded, "Henceforth, we must build our lives on the foundation of unyielding despair".

Instinctively though, we hold to a desire for truth, and even an experience of it. The sun is warm on my face, I love my children, water is wet. These are truths and we don't want to let go of them.

Religions also speak of truth. For the Buddha, the search for the ending of suffering led him to the idea that all desire must be overcome. This Dharma, or truth, is part of the core of Buddhist teaching. Does it describe everything we face as humans? For Muslims, the Qu'ran is the literal truth of Allah revealed to Muhammed. It cannot therefore contain any errors, if they were discovered, it would discredit the whole.

For Christians truth is found somewhere else. The Bible can be relied on as revealing God to creation, but for Christianity, truth is to be found ultimately in a person, in Jesus. We can therefore

have a relationship with truth, knowing that what we hear and experience can be relied on. That we can ask questions and expect answers. That just as Jesus lived a human life, so we are affirmed and known by God. That as he challenged the religious authorities for placing burdens on people, so he promises true freedom to us. Freedom from fear through his love. Freedom from our mistakes, by his forgiveness and freedom from confusion by putting our trust in him. Jesus said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life" John 14:6. Not just his truth, but he IS truth and therefore utterly trustworthy and a firm foundation to build life on.

Why didn't Jesus answer Pilate? Because Pilate was looking for a concept, or an idea of truth. Instead Truth was standing in front of him as a flesh and blood person and Pilate couldn't recognise him. Then by dying for us, Jesus even reveals the truth of what happens to us after death, because he rose from the dead in order to draw us all to him. St. Augustine said, "All our hearts are restless until they find their rest in Him". May you know the Truth and may the Truth set you free.





Maintaining Binsted's Rights of Way

The warm weather in June, followed by the cooler, wetter weather in July has meant that vegetation has grown at quite a rate this summer, leading to some parts of the Rights of Way network becoming rather overgrown. The Binsted volunteers have been out regularly, cutting back vegetation to make the paths more accessible. In some cases, the scale of the problem requires a work party to address it properly – many hands make light work – and we are in the process of organising those. We hope you have noticed the difference, since some of these issues were reported directly to us using the contact details at the foot of this piece, which we always welcome.

Wyck Lane is an "Other route with public access" with a serious mud problem – it does not fall under the jurisdiction of HCC Countryside Services, who are the contact point for this volunteer team, but that did not stop us reporting it, with photographic evidence, on the HCC website. Sadly, this approach has resulted in absolutely no return communication. Our next step is to escalate this to the HCC team directly responsible for this route – which is not easy to identify. Wish us luck!

In the June issue of this magazine, I mentioned the major project to resurface parts of Bridleway 62 between its eastern end in Frith End and the end of the Straits Inclosure. Following a volunteer work party to successfully install tree guards on some particularly vulnerable oaks, the contractors were able to start the resurfacing work on time. The project was completed towards the end of June and the Bridleway has been open since then. It is a complete revelation – a route that used to be rutted and muddy, even in summer, and sometimes impassable in winter, is now a smooth, firm path suitable for all bridleway users, covering a distance of over 2.2km from Frith End to The Straits. As if to prove the point, I was walking back along 62 after an afternoon trimming vegetation up near Wheatley, when I encountered my neighbours heading the other way in the evening sun, adults walking the dog and the children on their bikes - certainly not something that would have happened last summer! This is an important east - west route, linking the

two halves of the parish. It is so nice to have it back!

The Binsted volunteers are regularly inspecting the parish's paths, but if you would like to report a problem on any of the Binsted Rights of Way, whether it is a fallen tree, a broken stile, a collapsed fingerpost or simply some overgrown vegetation, you can do so online on the Hampshire "Report a problem on a right of way" page - this requires you to create an account and log in to the site first. Alternatively, you can use the volunteer team's own email address to do so - it is BinstedRoW@ gmail.com. One final way of reporting a Rights of Way problem is to do so on the Binsted Community Facebook group. The volunteer team will try to identify problems reported there and deal with them promptly if we can – in all cases, please give as much location information as possible.



In these long, hot spells we are having to get used to, shade is so important. The UNESCO standard is that 30% of our environment should be shaded. Beech woodland is shady and characterised by a dense carpet of fallen leaves and mast husks which prevent most woodland plants from growing. Only specialist shade-tolerant plants can survive beneath a beech canopy. Oh, and overheated humans and their panting dogs.

Beech trees are big. The tallest native tree in the UK is a beech that stands at 45m (2018) at the bottom of Hagg Wood, along the River Derwent in Derbyshire. Round here you get the impression that they are one of the commonest species, but, actually, common beech is only considered truly native to south-east England and south-east Wales. They grow in woods or as single trees, usually on drier, free-draining soils, such as chalk, limestone and light loams. They often hold on to their leaves throughout winter, a trait known as marcescence. This makes them popular as hedging, especially as marcescence is encouraged by trimming. It's certainly a word worth committing to memory if you want to impress your friends.

Young leaves are lime green with silky hairs. As they mature they become darker and hairless. Unless, of course, it's a copper beech. Also known as purple beech, this is a cultivated form of the same species. Apparently some people don't like the purple colour, but I can't think why. The colour puts the tree's metabolism under stress, as purple leaves are less efficient at photosynthesis. If you walk under a copper beech you will see that the shaded leaves have reverted to green in order to improve their take up of the limited light.

Based on the appearance of the leaves only, they are easily confused with hornbeam (another tree prone to marcescence) but the two are told apart readily by their fruits. Female beech flowers grow in pairs, surrounded by a cup. The cup becomes woody once pollinated, and encloses one or two beech nuts (known as beechmast). Meanwhile, female hornbeam catkins develop into festoons of papery, green winged fruits, known as samaras.

The scientific name is Fagus sylvatica. In Celtic mythology, Fagus was the god of beech trees. Beech is associated with femininity and is often considered the queen of British trees, where oak is the king. The tree was thought to have medicinal properties and its leaves were boiled to make a poultice which was used to relieve swellings. Forked beech twigs are also traditionally used for divining.

For me, though, it's the book tree. Some scholars believe that the name beech is derived from the Saxon boc, which also gives us 'book'. Tablets of beech bark were used for early writing. Carving initials into trees goes back thousands of years. The Romans had a saying Crescunt illae crescant amores, meaning 'as these letters grow, so may our love'. The smooth bark of the beech particularly lends itself to such starry-eyed vandalism. In the 1880's Joseph Tubb from Dorchester carved an entire poem of his on the trunk of what has since been named the Poem Tree at Wittenham Clumps in Oxfordshire. It was inspired by his love of the local landscape and its history, and it aoes like this:

...Around this hill the ruthless Danes intrenched And these fair plains with gory slaughter drench'd While at our very feet where stands that stately tower In days gone by up rose the Roman power.. (It probably looks better on the original bark!)

The report was very thorough and looked at a lot of evidence. The final few sentences of the report sum up all the hard work that has gone into achieving this award:

"I hope you and your Eco-Committee take great pride in your achievements, when listed it's surprising how many there are – however, the improvements to your school environment with the litter reducing and biodiversity initiatives and, most of all, your really superb community work (we loved those) all nicely stand out!"





At the time of writing this, we only have a few weeks left at school before the summer break but we still have lots of things planned between now and then and we are all really looking forward to welcoming our new Headteacher, Mrs Vicky Hallett, in September.

The Scaffolding is Coming Down!



At the time of writing, the scaffolding is coming down! It has been quite a journey with a number of problems being encountered during the work, including finding that the condition of the apex of the spire and the weathervane constituted a Health and Safety issue. The additional repair work could not therefore be postponed.

With all the extra work, the original quoted costs have inevitably increased, the scaffolding on the tower alone has been costing nearly £4,000 per month as it had to be specifically designed because the church is Grade 1 listed. In order to complete the works, we have had to use all our available funds and have also had to take out a loan.

We have already had donations to the Spire appeal that was launched at the beginning of the year amounting to just over £17,000 (as at end July) and Binsted PCC would like to extend their gratitude to everyone who has generously donated so far.

We need however to raise a further £40,000. We are therefore having to renew our appeal for donations.
