Benefice Letter

When does Christmas start? Each family will have different traditions for when the Christmas tree goes up or the lights are hung. A week before Christmas? 2 weeks? The beginning of December? Which are you? Shops start stocking Christmas merchandise in September and the retail machine really begins to roll after Halloween. Christmas is a major event in our national economy and is used by analysts to work out financial confidence and impacts Government budgetary thinking. The question I would like to ask is whether we start too soon?

Office Christmas parties, social events and drinks add to December becoming a very social, and potentially expensive time of year. For families struggling to budget, it is very difficult, with the weight of social expectation meaning that many go into debt. In terms of the Church, we have lost any real sense of Advent as a season. Running for the 4 Sundays prior to Christmas Day, Advent traditionally is a fast, a season of reflection and peaceful preparation before the feast of Christmas. It is a time to remember and anticipate that, as the Creed puts it, Jesus, "will come again to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end." During Advent, the role of the prophets to look forward to the coming of the Messiah, and his return, are examined.

Christmas doesn't start until Christmas Eve. Then with all those prophesies ringing in our ears, we read of a hill at nighttime and suddenly angels appearing to shepherds. "Don't be afraid, I bring you good news of great joy for everyone! The Saviour - yes, the Messiah, the Lord - has been born tonight in Bethlehem." The suddenness of this announcement is lost to us, with our 3 months of retail advertising. Then the Feast of Christmas is celebrated for 12 days and should be the time for carol singing, visiting family, presents and Yule logs. A season of joy and not just 24 hours. I know people who take down the tree on Boxing Day. It's all over and done for another year. We seem to have lost the experience of extended joy and celebration which would take us through the New Year. Then we have Epiphany, the Feast of Light on 6th January where we celebrate the visit of the Wise Men and that Jesus is for all the nations of the world.

Retail and finance seem to have warped our experience of Christmas and it is very different from how it would have







We have been really busy here at Bentley CE Primary School during the autumn term. Here are some of our highlights:

Competitions

The Year 5 and 6 rugby team took part in a rugby competition at Amery Hill school with lots of other schools in the local area. The team played really well in the first external sporting event of the school year and demonstrated great sportsmanship, coming third overall.

Four children from Year 5 and 6 represented the school in 'The Logic Cup', a mathematical challenge at Lord Wandsworth College. There was a quiz with five rounds containing various maths puzzles, a maths trail and a fast paced maths relay! The children worked fantastically together and loved having the opportunity to take part.

Educational Visits

We have been on lots of visits to take our learning out of the classroom.

Year 2 learned all about the life of Florence Nightingale on their visit to the Royal Victoria Hospital. The children dressed up as nurses and soldiers to find out more about how Florence improved hospitals at the time of the Crimean War. Year 3 visited the Gordon Brown Centre to take part in activities such as den building and a sensory nature walk.

Year 4 enjoyed their visit to the Arundel Wetland Centre where they learned all about the wildlife that inhabits wetland areas, took part in pond dipping, went on a boat ride and sketched the river.

Harvest Festival

The children participated in our Harvest Festival service, led by Revd Matt Boyes, where they shared harvest poems, art work and prayers. Generosity was the Christian value we had been focusing on during the autumn term and this was demonstrated by the generous offerings of food the children brought in to donate to the Alton Food Bank.

Eco-Schools

Here at Bentley we are all passionate about nature and protecting our wonderful world. Last year's Eco-Council started a litter picking project to try to reduce litter in our local area. They created litter picking backpacks which contain reusable gloves and a bag, a foldable litter picker and a notebook to record how many bags of litter have been collected. To support us in this work, Young ACAN (Alton Climate Action Network) presented this year's Eco-Council with 20 foldable litter pickers, courtesy of an EHDC grant from Cllr Ginny Boxall, to add to the litter picking backpacks.

We have also signed up to take part in the National Education Nature Park. This is a national project which has been commissioned by the DfE and is led by the Natural History Museum. The project was officially launched in our Eco lessons with an activity called 'Hidden Nature' where the children were encouraged to look for less obvious signs of nature in the school grounds. We found everything from ladybird larva to maggots burrowed inside acorns! We have lots more to look forward to in the next few weeks, especially our Christmas productions and our Christmas Fair. If you would like to know more about our school or would like to visit, then please do get in touch. We always welcome visitors and the children are keen to show how proud they are of their school. We have a few spaces in various year groups across the school so, if you are looking for a school place for your child, or know someone who is, why not come and visit us? We would love to meet you!

HISTORY PRESERVED IN ALLEN GALLERY PROJECT

Supported by funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Allen Gallery in Alton is undergoing a transformational journey. Hampshire Cultural Trust (HCT), which operates the Gallery, is coming to the end of the development phase of the project, Rediscovering the Allen Gallery. During this phase, HCT has been revealing and sharing some of the untold stories of the ceramic collections housed at the Allen Gallery and in wider storage at the Trust's stores in Winchester. The project aims to refurbish the Allen Gallery and better showcase the nationally and internationally important ceramics collection, which is being researched, audited and photographed by a team of staff, volunteers and interns.

Since the project began at the start of 2023, over 5,000 out of a total of 7,000 objects in the extensive collection have been inventoried by the dedicated team, with more than 2,400 objects now photographed. These images will be added to the Trust's online collections, giving general access to these historical treasures. HCT has been working in partnership with the University of Southampton, the University for the Creative Arts in Farnham, and Kingston University.

The collection boasts an astounding array of ceramic objects from the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries, including exquisite Chinese and

European pieces. It is widely recognised for its vast scope and exceptional quality, with some specialists likening it to a miniature Victoria and Albert Museum (V&A). The collection is also a comprehensive academic resource, showcasing the stylistic and technological evolution of English ceramics from its origins with Bernard Leach, regarded as the 'father of British studio pottery', and featuring works by influential figures such as Hans Coper, Lucie Rie, Michael Cardew and Siddig el Nigoumi. Highlights include a Palissy dish, crafted around 1630, from the studio of French ceramicist Bernard Palissy, and a Popish Plot tile, likely made by Jan Ariens van Hamme in Vauxhall, London, in 1679-80. This is an example of a very early English tin-glazed tile that played a pivotal role in introducing this craft to England. A further treasure, an Ignis statue, made in London and dated 1679, is considered to be among the top 20 pieces of English ceramics due to its uniqueness and flat back design, which has never been recorded in any similar figure.

Dead trees new life

Winter is closing in. And, of course, it is a time of dead, rotting things, creepy crawlies and fantastical fungi. That is a cause for celebration.

Examples of deadwood are all around us, whether an ancient, stag-headed tree in a field, logs lying on the floor in your local park, or dead trees just about managing to stay upright within woodlands. Deadwood is part of the final, and arguably most important and interesting part of a tree's life, and the beginning of so much more.

Wood stores a lot of nutrients within its structure. Once a tree, or part of a tree, has reached the end of its life it is decomposed by a complex combination of bacteria, fungi and other microorganisms which breaks it down and releases these nutrients back into the soil. This process is called nutrient cycling and is the building block of all life, feeding new growth of plants, and in turn microorganisms, fungi, insects, birds, amphibians, mammals, and us, in healthy ecosystems. It is essential for new life to form. This is why areas rich in deadwood, such as our ancient woodlands, are so biodiverse. In fact, more than 2,000 different invertebrate species are dependent on decaying wood to complete their lifecycle. Deadwood houses and feeds some of our most beloved wildlife, from grass snakes and great-crested newts, to green woodpeckers and Bechstein's bats nesting and roosting in hollows and cavities.

The fungal importance of deadwood, and in particular, undisturbed soil where deadwood has been allowed to decay for very long periods of time, is only recently beginning to be understood. Networks of fungal hyphae, tap into the rooting systems of whole communities of trees, allowing the sharing of nutrients to help stressed trees, the sending of signals to warn of predation and assistance when dealing with periods of drought. The role of deadwood and decaying matter within these networks is massive, feeding whole tree and plant communities with recycled nutrients to be used again.

The way we see deadwood has changed in recent years. Previously, the hollowing out of an old tree was seen as detrimental, but we now know that it is an essential part of the tree's life, using resources stored within the trunk to provide nutrients for the tree in its old age when it might be struggling. It was thought that deadwood, either attached to a tree or on the ground, could negatively impact a tree's health by increasing risk of infection by pests and diseases, and so it was routine practice to remove it. In some cases, this is still necessary, such as removing wood material infected with aggressive forms of honey fungus, but we are now much more aware of the benefits, in addition to the problems, associated with deadwood.

There has been considerable progress in tackling the issue of 'tidiness' when it comes to managing our public spaces. Habitat piles, bug hotels, natural (deadwood) play equipment, and in-situ deadwood are more commonplace in our parks and gardens today. Tidiness is not the natural way, and over-managed trees and woodlands are poor for biodiversity. Deadwood is essential for our trees' healthy functioning. By incorporating deadwood into our landscapes, we can help our trees live healthy lives and in turn, reap the benefits that healthy trees provide.

First of all a big "Thank You" to everyone who took the time to complete the Parish Survey over the summer. By far the biggest concern highlighted by residents across the parish in the survey was worsening levels of traffic, speeding and accidents, most notably:

- The increase in volumes of traffic, speeding and accidents on the A325 and on the Blacknest Road from Frith End to Bentley crossroads.
- The Jalsa Salana festival and other diversions off the A31/A325 and Kingsley roads creating chaos, disruption and damage on our narrow local roads that are unsuitable for large volumes of traffic and large commercial vehicles.
- Air Traffic The proposed expansion of Farnborough Airport and the impact of the noise it will generate across the parish.

There are no "quick fixes" on any of these issues, and the Parish Council has no direct authority or powers in this area. However, it is a key priority of the Parish Council to work on your behalf to secure improvements from Hampshire Highways, East Hants District Council and other organisations such as Jalsa Salana and SSE Electricity whose events and projects affect traffic on local roads. We totally understand the strength of local feeling on these subjects.

Our Transport Working Group, which met in early November, has been expanded to create a greater capacity for work on Transport issues, and now includes some non-councillor members. We are also working with other local Parish Councils on cross-border problems; and we very much appreciate the continued support and hard work of County Councillor Mark Kemp-Gee on our traffic issues.

Some specific transport items we've been working on in recent months include:

- Engaging with Hampshire Highways/County Council to secure traffic calming measures to mitigate Bordon's expansion on local roads (particularly on A325 and the route from Frith End to Bentley crossroads).
- Engaging with a range of organisations to address safety and speeding concerns, to determine what measures can be taken to improve road safety blackspots

for pedestrians, cyclists, horse riders and drivers, and to address wider issues associated with verges / footpaths, HGV routing and public transport.

- Joining a working group set up by Jalsa Salana, to ensure that residents' views are heard and minimise traffic disruption in future years. We are working alongside other Parish Councils and District and County Councillors to help ensure a joined-up approach to the festival's licensing and highways aspects, taking residents' concerns into account to ensure the festival's traffic management plans prevent a repeat of the chaos experienced this year.
- Taking part in a group that is looking to minimise the impact of planned lengthy roadworks on the B3004 between Sleaford and Alton through Kingsley, which has the potential to cause disruption to residents through longer journey times and diversions.
- Objecting to planning proposals within the parish we believe could worsen existing transport and traffic issues.
- And making objections to Farnborough Airport's consultation, to try and stop the expansion.

If transport is a subject you're interested in, and you would like to help, we'd love to hear from you! You don't need to be an "expert" or need to commit too much time - a few people giving a couple of hours a month to keep things moving forwards would be hugely appreciated. Update from Bentley Parish Council



The main issues dominating the village community presently have been the rash of accidents at Bentley crossroads and Farnborough Airport's proposed expansion programme. We had 11 members of the public at our last Parish Council meeting on 9th October, which was great to see.

Crossroads

Our Councillors have been busy chasing up and meeting with Hampshire Highways to discuss preventative measures addressing safety at the crossroads. Analysis by the accident and injuries experts suggested that the junction layout is not a contributing factor. However, plans were discussed to raise the visibility of the junction.

New signage, such as crossroads warning signs, advanced 'Stop' signs and larger speed limit signs have been proposed by Hampshire Highways and agreed by the Parish Council as well as repositioning the Bentley village name plates and the southern approach to the junction upgraded to STOP. Hampshire Highways have informed us that these should be in situ by the time you read this article. Yellow lines prohibiting parking around the Memorial Hall which will increase visibility at the junction to traffic approaching from the Froyle direction, will take longer due to a statutory process required, including a public consultation.

Farnborough Airport

Farnborough Airport's proposed expansion is concerning, particularly as Bentley is situated on the main takeoff path. The existing permission is for 'business flights' but it is clear that much of the air traffic from Farnborough is weekend leisure flying with many of the destinations served by commercial flights from London airports.

The airport are looking to increase the number of flights from 50,000 to 70,000 per year, with a significant proportion of flight increases intended for weekends. As a Bentley resident, you have probably received a leaflet in the post, used by the applicant to demonstrate they have conducted a public consultation. If you want to object, it is important that you do so as the sponsor will claim that the public consultation demonstrated that the proposal had public support. Comments should have been received by 18th October, but you will have another opportunity to make a comment when the planning application is made to Rushmoor Borough Council, and we will help with suggested wording.

As an effort to reach and improve communication with all residents on such issues we have set up a Bentley Residents Action email distribution list. If you'd like to receive information on topics such as Farnborough Airport, please subscribe: bentley-residents-action@googlegroups.com.

Recreation Ground

Bentley Archers Cricket and Sports Club (BACSC) and the Parish Council are busy negotiating terms of the lease on the Recreation Ground. BACSC intend to improve the quality of the ground and install a new cricket square. The lease will allow them to obtain external funding for the project. As well as cricket during the summer months the club will run junior football during the winter season. We believe this venture is going to be of great benefit to many residents of the village.

Speaking of the Recreation Ground, our Play Area has had its annual inspection and all elements scored 'Low risk' and 'Very low risk' so no further major works needed (please inform the Clerk to report any if noticed). We're aiming to have it cleaned and any repairs completed annually.

Bentley Station

Next month a couple of Councillors will be attending a meeting in Aldershot to discuss Bentley Station, in particular Community Rail opportunities. There are gardening grants as well as opportunities to use the two redundant buildings at the station. Even though Bentley Station falls under Binsted Parish, we hope to work alongside them to improve and make use of funding support.

Council Business

Our Parish Council meetings are on the 2nd Monday of every month and residents are welcome to attend. The meeting agenda is posted on all village noticeboards and on our website on the Wednesday before the meeting.

We will be looking to co-opt a new Councillor shortly so keep your eyes peeled for notices. We're always short of women applying so if you want the Council to represent a good cross section of residents please apply! Having said that, all applications are very welcome.

Maintaining Binsted's Rights of Way


Although still mild, late October and the start of November heralded the return of heavy rain and at least one major storm with strong winds. It meant that the volunteers of the Binsted Rights of Way team have still been busy with cutting back vegetation on the rather muddy footpaths and bridleways of the parish, but were also on the lookout for fallen trees. The funding grant received from Hampshire County Council has been used to book three members of the team on a training course on the safe use of powered brushcutters in January 2024. So, we will be better prepared for action in the spring and summer of next year.

The recently resurfaced section of Bridleway 62, between its eastern end in Frith End and the end of the Straits Inclosure, is now six months old. As we brace ourselves for another rainy winter, it will be interesting to see whether it holds up as well as the sections that were resurfaced several years ago. The initial signs are good, with new ditches and drainage ensuring that the parts that used to regularly get flooded have remained easily passable. Only time (and the weather) will tell, so we will reassess again in the Spring. This project was such a hit with all Bridleway users walkers, horse riders and cyclists alike - that we were inspired to achieve something similarly transformative, but more modest in scale, for another of the local Bridleways which is blighted by a section of deep mud, particularly in winter.

Bridleway 41 runs from the Blacknest Road, just north of the Jolly Farmer, past Blacknest Fields – our local site for nature recovery and community greenspace and along the forest edge all the way up to Bucks Horn Oak. As well as linking up with the Shipwright's Way and the Alice Holt forest east of the A325, it's also a useful route from Bucks Horn Oak down to Blacknest Fields. There is a section at the forest edge, which has always been problematic due to deep mud, which can persist all year round. Binsted Parish Council were successful in applying to HCC Countryside Services for funding to improve the bridleway and it turned out that the contractor wanted to start the project almost immediately. It all happened so quickly, the newly resurfaced section was ready for the Volunteer Day at Blacknest Fields at the end of October. The Rights of Way team turned out to make a final clearance of the holly and other vegetation that reduce the usable width and height of the bridleway, then joined the other volunteers at Blacknest Fields for some further work, followed by hot soup and cake - all highly sociable! I hope you get a chance to enjoy using the bridleway in the near future.

The Binsted volunteers are regularly inspecting the parish's paths, but if you would like to report a problem on any of the Binsted Rights of Way, whether it is a fallen tree, a broken stile, a collapsed fingerpost or simply some overgrown vegetation, you can do so online on the Hampshire "Report a problem on a right of way" page – this requires you to create an account and log in to the site first. Alternatively, you can use the volunteer team's own email address to do so – it is BinstedRoW@gmail.com. One final way of reporting a Rights of Way problem is to do so on the Binsted Community Facebook group. The volunteer team will try to identify problems reported there and deal with them promptly if we can – in all cases, please give as much location information as possible.
