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Benefice Letter

The Sirens were creatures from the Greek myths who lived on a rocky shoreline and who sang to sailors in passing ships, so bewitching them that they threw themselves overboard or crashed their vessels on the rocks. Odysseus, the Greek hero, tells his sailors to plug their ears so that they don't hear the Siren's song, but some don't and are lost. Orpheus in another myth, sails the same route and, hearing the Sirens, takes down his harp and sings a better song, so he and all his crew are safe.

It is something deeply human, to seek for better songs. Songs that explain and inspire. Songs that conjure up worlds that are worth striving for and which capture our imagination. Perhaps part of why William Blake's hymn "Jerusalem" is so popular, as well as having a great melody, it conjures up a vision of England that is worth striving far.

Politicians are struggling at the moment, as we face a General Election later this year, to find a song that will resonate with voters and inspire confidence. Sometimes the songs that are sung are Siren-calls, if we think of the power of Hitler's oratory, or the bile of hate preachers and extremists. These only lead to darkness and destruction, never life.

Eostre was a goddess of spring, or the dawn, who was worshipped as the long days of winter gave way to the new life of spring. Her name is the root of Easter which we will celebrating at the end of the month. Why is a Christian festival named after a pagan goddess?

The famous Anglo-Saxon historian, Bede tells us that by his time, the worship of Eostre had gone out of fashion, but her name was retained for this time of year. The return of spring is worth celebrating, we all feel better seeing the first flowers bloom in our gardens and the promise of more colour and longer days to come. But Easter is a better song than just spring. The melody that was sung to Eostre has been magnified and turned into a full-blown symphony of praise, because Easter tells us that death has been defeated.

We remember the betrayal and sacrifice of Jesus in his agonising death on Good Friday, but Easter Sunday changes everything. Jesus, who was dead, is alive. His death accomplished victory over human evil, and his resurrection is his vindication and the birth of our greatest hope. That by

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faith in him, we too, will live forever. That death is not the final end, but there is still a greater song for us all to sing who learn the tune.

Easter is a better song than Eostre could ever hum.

In the book of Revelation, at the end of the Bible, John hears a loud voice saying, "Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." Rev 21:3-4

May this Easter time be one of great joy for you and all whom you love. May you hear the greatest song of all, that God sings over his creation. May you join in with it, and know God's love for you personally.



The Benefice of Bentley, Binsted and Froyle are looking to appoint an Anna Chaplain covering the villages of the Benefice, plus looking to develop support in the villages of Kingsley and Oakhanger, who will be joining the Benefice through Pastoral Reorganisation. The Anna Chaplaincy is a post promoting the spiritual welfare of older people. It is a pioneering role offering spiritual support to older people, especially, though not exclusively, to those living in residential and nursing homes and to their relatives and the people who care for them.

The Anna Chaplain also has a wider role within the community as an advocate, and champion of the contribution older people make to society. This is an opportunity to draw alongside people of strong, little or no faith, and in encouraging the wider church to celebrate and cherish older members of their congregations.

The role also involves supporting the existing, and recruiting new "Anna Friends", who are volunteers with a passion for ministry among the elderly made up of congregation members from the churches in the Benefice.

It is an occupational requirement for the person appointed to be a professing and practicing Christian (Equality Act 2010).

The role is a part-time one of 12 hours per week. Enhanced DBS and references will be required.

Bentley CE Primary

The spring term is in full flow here at Bentley and we have had lots of opportunities to extend our learning by taking part in sporting events or going on educational visits. Here is an update on some of the things we have been doing during the first half of the spring term.

Educational Visits

Year 4 visited Butser Ancient Farm to support their learning about the Anglo-Saxons. The children had the opportunity to experience what life was like in Anglo-Saxon times, exploring the houses and learning how people lived, cooked and spent their time. The children participated in activities such as wool spinning and chalk carving. They found out that the Anglo-Saxons came to Britain because of the good farming land and the climate.

Year 5 and Year 6 travelled to the O2 arena in London to sing with thousands of other primary aged children at the Young Voices concert. As well as performing the songs they'd been rehearsing since September, the children watched performances by talented musicians and dancers from all over the country. Darcy said, 'The arena was humungous with thousands of people's voices filling it. All I can say is that it was the best experience I have ever had!'

Year 4 visited Eggar's to watch Shakespeare's play, A Midsummer Night's Dream performed by their students. The children enjoyed hearing the Shakespearean language (which was explained to them as they journeyed through the play) and were taught a dance so they could join in at the end. 'My favourite character was Lysander because he was really funny in the fight against Demetrius,' said Otto. Towards the end of the play, we were taught a dance so that we could join in with the actors. It was tricky but fun because we had to make sure our arms and legs were moving at the correct times!

Year 2 visited the SeaCity Museum in Southampton to support their learning about the Titanic. The children had a tour of the museum, learned about members of the crew and about those who had bravely helped others during the sinking. Amelie claimed it was the best trip ever saying, 'We did four activities. In one of the activities we had to smell the different smells on the Titanic. One smelled of cheesy feet which was the smell of the gym!'

Year R went on their very first local walk to the shop and the park. Whilst on their walk the children were looking out for words. Alex said, 'We saw words on signposts, gates and people's houses. They were everywhere!'. Pen said, 'In the park we balanced the seesaw to help us find out how heavy things are.'

Sporting Events

A team of 16 Key Stage 2 children from Years 3 - 6 represented Bentley at the Alton Schools' Swimming Gala with 11 schools taking part in total. Children competed in freestyle, backstroke and relay races. Our Bentley children demonstrated superb team spirit as they cheered each other on and swam their fastest for our school, scoring 80 points and coming 5th in the large schools' category overall.

Gymnasts from Year 3 and Year 4 took part in the local schools' gymnastics competition. The team had to learn and perform a floor routine as well as two vaults in front of four judges! Our team did us proud coming second with only 0.6 of a mark between us and the winning team!

This term's cross country event took place at Binsted recreation ground. Our team of children performed brilliantly, demonstrating our school values and team spirit as they supported and encouraged other members of their team. Our points will be added to the rest of the scores from all the cross country events over the year with the winning school being announced later on in the year.

Two dodgeball events have taken place at Eggar's and Amery Hill over the last few weeks. This fast paced game is thoroughly enjoyed by all the children who take part and encourages the development of skills such as teamwork, strategising and tactics.

We have lots more exciting events and experiences planned for the children over the rest of the spring term. If you would like to know more about our school or would like to visit, then please do get in touch. We always welcome visitors and the children are keen to show how proud they are of their school. If you are interested in your child joining us here at Bentley, we do have some places available in some of our classes across the school and would love to hear from you.

Chairman's Report

Last week saw the completion of improvements to the signage and road markings at Bentley crossroads. We were blessed with fine, dry weather which meant that not only could the new signs be planted, but the white line marking could also be completed.

Apart from more visible signs all round, the major change at the junction is the replacement of a "Give Way" sign for a "Stop" sign on the southern approach along River Road. It has taken some time to implement the changes, but I think you will agree that the crossroads are now much more visible to approaching traffic from all directions, and we hope this eliminates further accidents at the junction.

As I mentioned previously, to improve visibility at the junction to traffic approaching from the Froyle direction we intend to introduce yellow lines to prohibit parking around the Memorial Hall. This is a statutory process and takes longer to implement. In the meantime, we would ask local residents along the old A31 to avoid parking too close to the Memorial Hall. Finally, I'd like to thank John Wilson, our Transport Officer, and Mark Kemp-Gee, our County Councillor, for all their efforts in achieving these improvements.

The public consultation for the Farnborough Airport expansion planning application closed in November. To help us make an informed comment, the parish council. with the help of some local residents whose support was very much appreciated, engaged a planning consultant to analyse the application. We would also like to thank Binsted and Froyle parish councils for their support. Whilst making our own comment, we distributed the planning consultant's analysis to the community, and we would like to thank all those who submitted comments. We will wait to hear the decision from Rushmoor Borough Council.

On other planning matters, during the latter part of last year we completed our Neighbourhood Plan public consultation: We are required to make a revision to the plan every five years. We are now absorbing the feedback from the consultation and completing

our final draft ready for submission to EHDC. The plan allows us to have a say in any future local development by providing a set of land use policies specific to Bentley. Our hope is that the plan will be made during this summer.

At the same time EHDC are developing a new Local Plan for the district. The draft plan was published at the end of January when their public consultation began. We do have some concerns about the plan as regards Bentley and will be distributing information about these concerns during February so that all residents can submit comments to EHDC. The closing date for submissions is Monday 4th March, which we realise is close to the distribution date for this magazine but we will be using other channels of communication to reach you earlier and give you plenty of time to consider your response to the Local Plan.

Speaking of communications, we will be making an announcement about improvements to our lines of communication to the parish at the Annual Parish Assembly meeting in April. More will be revealed at that gathering. On a more traditional communications note, as we are still obliged to post details of parish meetings on noticeboards, we have installed a brand new noticeboard at the Memorial Hall (the old one was falling apart) commemorating the centenary of the hall.

Finally, the aforementioned Annual Parish Assembly will be held at the Memorial Hall on the evening of Monday 22nd April. This is a chance to hear about what's been happening in the parish over the past twelve months. We'll be receiving reports from the many clubs and institutions in Bentley as well as hearing from our district and county councillors and the parish council. There will be time for questions and discussion. All are welcome and we will be serving refreshments after the meeting so please come along. If you are new to Bentlev it's a great opportunity to get involved in the community.

Luminosa and Friends to bring the Grandeur of Mozart's Mass in C Minor!

Fresh from the huge success of the 'Haydn Nelson Mass' concert held in Frensham at the end of 2023. Alton based choir Luminosa is delighted to announce their first concert of 2024, returning to the beautiful All Saints Church in Odiham, where you can see them perform Mozart's famous Mass in C Minor. The performance will add an extra level of excitement due to the additions from the composer Philip Wilby of the final sections of the work (the Credo and the Agnus Dei), which remained unfinished by Mozart.

Conducted by their creative and talented Choral director, Rebekah Abbott, the Choir is also honoured to be supported by Michael Higgins who will provide inspiring organ accompaniment.

Fellow of the Royal College of Music, Michael has performed throughout the UK at venues including the Royal Festival Hall (London), Symphony Hall, (Birmingham) and Usher Hall (Edinburgh).

Continuing with the great relationship established between Luminosa and London's Trinity Laban Conservatoire, soloists Rachel Newberry, Rebecca Chandler, Jonathan Upfold and Alexander Chapman will also be performing on what is set to be a very special evening.

The work itself was written in 5 parts originally. Finished in 1783 and written as a wedding tribute to Mozart's wife Constanze, who sang the soprano solo part herself upon its premiere. The work embodies pomp and solemnity from Salzburg traditions of the time, but

it also looks forward to the symphonic masses of Joseph Haydn. The work contains moments such as the sombre *Kyrie*, contrasted with soaring soprano duets, and a Gloria which is both rejoicing and eerily quiet.

Luminosa hopes you can join them for an evening to remember on Saturday 23rd March at All Saints Church, Odiham at 7pm. Generous sponsorship from Hattingley Valley Wines and Knight Frank allows tickets to be available at just £15 for adults (under 12s-£5), available on Ticketsource (www.luminosamusic.com).

Tickets are already selling fast, and with Luminosa's last four concerts selling out well before the event, ensure you secure yours early. There will be a retiring collection in support of the work of Asthma and Lung UK.

Most of you will have heard about the financial constraints affecting the County Council - a shortfall of £132 million. Hampshire Cultural Trust, which operates the Curtis Museum and Allen Gallery, is severely affected. The Gallery is safe, thanks to the ambitious new project

Rediscovering the Allen Gallery.

This plan is looking to receive further funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and has already had financial support confirmed by East Hampshire District Council and Alton Town Council. The Museum, alas, is under threat of closure in 2026.

We who are involved - management, volunteers and visitors - are hoping the Museum can be saved. It is an important repository for the area's history - from ancient fossils, Anglo-Saxon treasures, Civil War artifacts, - to Jane Austen and Brewing.

In the meantime, come and look at your town's heritage, while it is still free and accessible.

Mini Egg Fudge Recipe

Ingredients

- · 500g white chocolate
- 400g tin condensed milk
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 2x 80g bags mini eggs

Instructions

- Line a small rectangular baking tray or cake tin with baking parchment. If you don't have any, tin foil also works.
- Break or chop the milk chocolate into pieces and place them all in a large microwavable bowl. Pour over the condensed milk and mix together well.
- 3. Heat in the microwave for short bursts of around 30 seconds, stirring in between, until the chocolate has almost melted. Be careful not to overheat or burn the chocolate.
- 4. Once the chocolate is melted, beat well with a wooden spoon until it all comes together smoothly. Add the vanilla extract and mix in well.
- 5. Scatter half of the mini eggs over the base of the tray. Tip the fudge into the tin and spread around so it is in an even layer in the tin. Use a spatula to smooth the top down.
- 6. Scatter the remaining mini eggs on top of the fudge, then carefully push them all into the fudge, working quickly before it sets.
- 7. Pop the fudge into the fridge and leave to set for at least 2 hours or overnight. Once the fudge has set hard, take it and cut into pieces.

There are songs I like. There are songs I don't like so much. And there are a few songs that knock me off my perch.

I share this sentiment with song writer Lori Lieberman. She was inspired to write lines like

"He sang as if he knew me",

after attending a concert by Don Maclean. This could have been said about much of his work, though it is assumed Lieberman was probably thinking of Maclean's great song 'American Pie.

Great as it is, it still doesn't quite reach my short list of perch-knocker-offers.

But another song did, that I heard for the first time just before Christmas. To reassure those readers who are starting to wonder if it's really me writing this, the song I'm going to tell you about is a song about trees. So much so, that it's actually entitled "Tree Song".

I had been sent by the Woodland Trust to the Church of St Lawrence in The Square, in Winchester to listen to a concert by the Take Note Chamber Choir. They were donating proceeds from the concert, as well as exit collections, to the Trust, I was to make a short speech of thanks at the interval. The singing was beautiful. Most of the songs, from all ages, were about trees. Further evidence, if any were needed, that trees have been in our lives for as long as we have been around. I was enthralled. Then, approaching the interval, they sang Anna Tabbush's Tree Song.

It's only a short song. It seemed to me like a shanty (but what do I know?) It tells of all the ways in which we benefit from trees, both physically and spiritually. I know this stuff. I talk about it all the time. But the chorus is simply:

But you chop us down, down, down
But you chop us down

A minute or two later I heard someone introducing me in order that I could make my little speech. But, at first, my legs wouldn't follow instructions. The choir had sung 'as if they knew me'. I did my best to pull myself together, but I fooled no-one.

Some nice people said afterwards that my blatherings were just as moving as if I'd made the polished presentation I'd actually prepared. But I had also surprised myself at my depth of feeling.

The Forest Research UK canopy cover Webmap project has naturally come to an end, after all 5,749 urban wards in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland had been assessed.

From the data collected, we were able to confirm that Welsh urban areas have on average the greatest canopy cover (18.1 %) whereas Northern Ireland's urban areas have the lowest (11.8 %). We also found out that only 27.6% of UK urban wards have a canopy cover higher than 20%, and that more deprived areas have generally lower canopy covers than wealthy ones, demonstrating inequality in tree equity throughout the UK.

20% is not an ambitious goal. The average in US cities is 30%. The figures for the UK are amongst the lowest in Europe.

You'll hear a lot about how many trees are planted every year. Naturally, you'll hear less about how many are chopped down. I suspect the two numbers, though, are more or less the same.

East Hants District Council Local Plan

In last month's Parish Magazine we wrote about how 2024 was going to be a busy year for largescale planning consultations affecting all areas of Binsted Parish. The East Hants District Council (EHDC) Local Plan has the potential to have the biggest impact on the parish over the coming years- the first draft of this plan has now been published, and by the time this article reaches your doorstep the consultation will be nearing its close date of 4 March. The plan contains potential sites for housing developments across East Hants, and includes a proposal for around 1000 houses at Neatham Down at the west of the parish. To provide some context on the size of this proposed development, our parish currently contains around 760 homes. The Parish Council have been reviewing the plan, attended a number of EHDC events to ask questions and better understand the detail, tried to find various routes to publicise the consultation, and run events to understand parishioners' views on the subject and strength of

feeling so we can submit our consultation response that reflects your views. But it is vital that if you feel strongly about the proposals that you also send in your response- please see https://ehdclocalplan.commonplace.is/. And you can find out more about the Parish Council's response and other activities on this subject at https://binstedparishcouncil.org. uk/consultations.

This is the first stage of the EHDC Local Plan, with further drafts and consultations later in the year, so this will be a subject I'm sure we'll be writing about again later in the year. If would like to get involved in helping the Parish Council shape our views and responses to this consultation, or you have a professional background in planning (or know someone who does) and would be prepared to assist the Parish Council in some of the more technical aspects of submitting responses we would love to hear from you. Update on Farnborough Airport Expansion Consultation

Many of you got in touch regarding the proposals to expand Farnborough Airport, the impact of additional noise pollution locally and wider environmental issues. The Parish Council joined forces with Bentley and Froyle to commission a report by planning consultants that formed the basis of our objection to the proposals.

The original date for Rushmoor Borough Council (RBC) to consider the application was in March, but this has been pushed back until the summer- RBC have requested additional information from Farnborough Airport Ltd, this additional information will need to be considered by RBC and consulted on again. With this timetable running into May's local council elections. RBC will not be formally determining the application until sometime after May. Parish Council Element of Your Council Tax Bill

At the start of 2024 BPC had to submit its budget to East Hants District Council to determine what's called our Preceptthe amount of money we require to deliver Parish Council services to you and therefore the amount you pay towards Parish Council services. We have worked

hard to keep cost increases down to a minimum, but the budget agreed and submitted is 5% higher than last year- the primary reasons for the rise include an allowance for increased insurance and utility costs (whilst we have decreased our fuel usage substantially in the last 12 months, we are coming to the end of fixed price contracts so we anticipate costs rising overall), cost-of-living increases to staff salaries, as well as increased materials and supplier costs. The budget can be found on our website, and over the coming months we will tell you more about where your money is spent more generally and the services we deliver, as well as finding ways to get your input and feedback on what you'd like to see the Parish Council focussing on.

Maintaining Binsted's Rights of Way

The 2023 /2024 Autumn and Winter period started with eight named storms in the first few months, causing flooding and many areas of deep mud on our footpaths. Since then, although storms have affected the northern parts of the country, our area has largely been bypassed by them. We have had a sustained drier period, which has made the state of our paths and bridleways much more palatable for walkers. I hope that is not tempting fate, with a few weeks of official winter still to go! Most of the fallen trees that we always expect during winter have been cleared, so very few obstacles remain. With daytime temperatures rising and the birds singing more actively, it is a great time to be out

walking – just remember the old adage "no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothing".

Three of the Binsted parish volunteers attended an official training course on the safe use of brushcutters and strimmers at the end of January, so we now have five members who have their "tickets", enabling them to work on the Rights of Way in Hampshire. The course was funded by a grant from Hampshire Countryside Services and they also provided sufficient funding for us to improve our collection of tools. As such, we are prepared and ready to tackle any overgrown vegetation on our paths, when it all starts growing again in the Spring. If you spot any paths that need attention, when you are out walking, please let us know using the methods described at the foot of this article.

Slow Ways (a Community Interest Company) aims to create a network of walking routes that connect all of Britain's towns, cities and National Parks. The initial set of routes has been designed and is being checked and verified for reliability by volunteers. Of the 6750 Slow Ways, 1358 have already been completed. There is only one that crosses Binsted Parish, running from Bentley to Bordon, via Bentley, Binsted and Kingsley parishes. It mainly goes along official footpaths, but a few short sections use the roads. If you are interested in walking this route, or taking advantage of the network when you are visiting other parts of the country, do take a look at the Slow Ways website, it is very useful.

The Alton Walking Festival for 2024 is nearly upon us again - it will run for the whole of May 2024. There will be over 100 walks with lengths from 1.5 to 25 miles and a variety of themes including wellbeing / mental health, natural history, old railways and local geology. A new feature for 2024 will be a range of "Spider Walks" where participants take public transport to neighbouring towns where the walks start, walking back to Alton. Intriguing! Booking for all of the walks starts on April 1st (no really!) and will be available through the Walk Alton / Alton Walking Festival website. You can pre-register for this right now at the same website.

The Binsted volunteers are regularly inspecting the parish's paths, but if you would like to report a problem on any of the Binsted Rights of Way, whether it is a fallen tree, a broken stile, a collapsed fingerpost or simply some overgrown vegetation, you can do so online on the Hampshire "Report a problem on a right of way" page - this requires you to create an account and log in to the site first. Alternatively, you can use the volunteer team's own email address to do so - it is BinstedRoW@gmail.com. One final way of reporting a Rights of Way problem is to do so on the Binsted Community Facebook group. The volunteer team will try to identify problems reported there and deal with them promptly if we can in all cases, please give as much location information as possible.

Thirty seconds passed. No one moved.

'I said get a move on, you apology for a platoon. Little boys with big job to do.'

Another ten seconds.

'GET UP!' the impatient sergeant bellowed.

With that we stirred from our slumbers. How many times had we done this before? Too many. I didn't join His Majesty's forces to sort out other people's messes. From being a small boy, I had dreamed of fighting a dragon to win the hand of a fair young maid or of routing the enemies of the kingdom. Certainly not this. Time only for a quick wash and brush up and then into uniform. No time to waste. I pulled on my beautifully pressed white shirt, fastening the tiny buttons carefully, and then the black trousers with the crisp, vertical creases over my long johns.

My was I smart! Over the top I wore a pristine, bright red jacket with black fastenings and gold epaulettes. Next came the broad leather belt with the shiny brass buckle.

I looked at my boots. Could I see the reflection of my face in them? Silly question. Of course I could. They were on next with the spurs and the laces, tied correctly as had been drilled into us at the Military Academy. Next was my sword, gleaming brightly inside its scabbard. My hand lightly touched the hilt and a familiar thrill ran through me.

Last of all came the shako, with its short black plume. My mother had been so proud to see me in my uniform and, as she said brimming over with pride at me, the shako was the cherry on the cake. As always, I felt the bees knees and stood ten feet tall, despite my five feet seven inches.

The others were also ready and we made our way together to the stables, making jokes about the task ahead. Stupid fellow, we all said laughing. The air was fresh and clear and the sky a most beautiful azure blue. Our horses were waiting for our arrival, peering expectantly

from their stables. They loved a bit of action. How were they to know that today would provide less of the action and more of the mundane?

I saddled Major up and carefully fastened the rest of the tack in place. His groom had done a great early morning job of shining his flanks to perfection. He was a feisty horse, ready for anything life threw at him. Like his rider, he was proud of his position in life and tossed his head from side to side, as if to say that he was prepared to take on the world.

All ready to move off, the riders were lined up in pairs, in lines as straight and true as any arrow flight. Some horses were impatient, snorting warm breath from their flaring nostrils, tossing their heads and scraping the hard, dry earth with their hooves. Major's tail was swishing, a sure sign that he was ready for the off.

The sergeant led the troop more slowly through the market place, to gain the maximum effect. Stallholders temporarily halted their setting up to gape at this flash of colour and barefoot urchins stood smartly to attention, wishing that this might be their own future.

We rode down the lane. between the fields of wheat and barley, and with the sun rising to our left, towards our destination. We knew exactly where to go, as in recent times we had been there on four different occasions. Ahead of

us, on higher ground, stood the magnificent castle, the Royal Standard of red and gold wafting gently in the soft breeze, and outside its gate we could already discern the small crowd that had inevitably gathered. There was a path leading down from the portcullis to the stream, with a wall along its length to separate it from the fields behind. The people were partly obscured by the wall. Some were crying, whilst others scratched their heads. The gazes of all of them were focussed on the same spot.

Our pace slowed as we neared them and then, when the sergeant signalled a halt, we stopped and dismounted.

'Now lads,' the sergeant said conspiratorially, 'early reports suggest that it might be worse than usual so brace yourselves. I don't want any

fainting or throwing up. Not good for the reputation of the platoon. Understood?'

Faint murmurs of agreement could be heard and we approached the spot, leading our horses behind us. Major and the rest were left looking over the wall, while we walked nervously behind it.

How can I best describe what we saw? 'An utter mess all over the stubbly ground' is the short answer. Pieces of casing were scattered over a small area and in between them was a mixture of goo. What were we to do? The sergeant set us to work but even his heart wasn't in it any more. He knew defeat, when it stared him squarely in the face and it showed in his demeanour.

We picked up the pieces and tried this way and that to reconstruct the familiar form but, after a manly effort, we had to admit that unfortunately all the King's horses and all the King's men couldn't put Humpty together again.



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

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
