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Benefice Letter

This month sees three great festivals of the Christian Church: Pentecost, Ascension Day and Trinity Sunday. Tucked away in the lesser commemorations, on 8th May, is the day to remember and celebrate Julian of Norwich. Julian was a 14th century Christian mystic and the first woman to have her works published in English by name. She lived in a small room attached to one of the many medieval churches in Norwich, never leaving it and spending her time in prayer and contemplation. Her most famous phrase is that, because of God's love towards us, "All will be well, all will be well, all manner of things will be well."

When I was working in the prison service, my predecessor left a quote on the noticeboard which read, "Everything will be fine in the end, if it's not fine, it's not the end." For many, these may sound like the hopeless and groundless wishful thinking of an eternal optimist. Just look at the news, Gaza and the Ukraine, and you can see that all is not well and no easy options for resolution are in view.

If we do not subscribe to belief in God, then we are left with a hope in human progress and the development of a social ethic which will give us the tools and motivation to work for good for all. Yet, as the recent film Oppenheimer shows us, groundbreaking theoretical leaps in science, can, when explored for their practical outcomes, lead to weapons of mass destruction and even greater moral questions. As Oppenheimer said after the successful Trinity test firing of the first atomic bomb, and quoting the Bhagavad Gita, "I am become death, the destroyer of worlds."

Science is a wonderful gift and is in no competition with faith, but scientism, the belief in only science as the way we will solve our problems and find our purpose is hopelessly flawed. The evidence shows we use science against ourselves as well as for ourselves and the ecological consequences are real.

We pray with all our might that Vladimir Putin will not be tempted to fulfil his threat of using nuclear weapons against Ukraine or NATO. We hope that the prospect of nuclear escalation is enough of a deterrent for anyone now, or in the future. Perhaps T.S. Eliot will be proved right in his poem, The Hollow Men, "this is the way the world ends, not with a bang, but a whimper."

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However, believing in a God whose very nature is love, offers a very different outcome and future for humanity and the world. The Bible is clear, that throughout history, God acts. He hears the cry of the oppressed and opposes the arrogant and proud. He overturns empires and encourages his people to learn, question, create, explore and above all, to love. We are encouraged to believe that he has a plan. That he intervenes to limit the worst of our evils and always calls us to back home to himself. In relationship with God, we become fully human. St Augustine said, "Our hearts are restless, until they find their rest in God."

God's promise, is that one day, we will not train for war anymore and that peace and justice will cover the earth, as God's kingdom over all is established. So far from the pious wishes of an eccentric medieval hermit. Julian of Norwich is correct in saying, "All will be well." It takes faith to see, and faith to work towards, but in the end ,God will restore and rescue his world. As Jesus says,

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God, trust also in me." John 14:4

School News - Binsted CE Primary

At Binsted we believe in the Christian values of Faith, Hope & Love.

Oak class (Reception) have had a fantastic spring term. We have been learning about planets in the solar system; it has been great fun dressing up as astronauts, making rockets so we can visit the moon and other planets, we even had a space station in our outdoor area to do our research.

We have spent a lot of time on subitising (instantly recognising numbers up to 5), doubling numbers, 2D and 3D shapes. The resources in our classroom and outdoor area have been a huge help in helping us to grasp the concept of repeated patterns, creating shapes, playing games that have helped develop our number fluency.

It's quite incredible the progress that has been made in Reception class. The children have been working on their phase two and three sounds in phonics and are now able to segment and blend words, reading full sentences. They enjoy drawing club which allows them to use their imagination and develop their language and skills.

Community Grants from Binsted Parish Council

Each year Binsted Parish Council sets aside some funding (typically around £5,000) to award as small grants to local organisations, for activities that benefit people living in the parish.

Any organisation which contributes to wider community life can apply, including community associations, clubs, local charities and local branches of national charitable organisations. We cannot, though, provide grants that only benefit specific individuals, or commercial enterprises.

Last year grants ranged from £50 to over £1,000, and included funds towards maintenance and repairs to our parish churches, playground improvements at Rowledge Primary School, equipment and running costs of East Hants Citizens Advice and Hampshire Victim Support.

The Parish Council is keen to ensure that these grants contribute towards the life of our community in a wide variety of ways and across a wide variety of organisations. And so we welcome grant applications big or small, for existing activities and initiatives, or for a new project or idea. To apply for funding you will need to complete a short form that can be found on our website https://binstedparishcouncil.org. uk/news/community-grants-frombinsted-parish-council that asks for information about what you want funding for, how it will benefit the community, and some financial information about the activity and the organisation you are applying on behalf of. The closing date for applications is **31 May**. Application assessments and decisions will be made by the Parish Council at the Full Council Meeting in June.

Peggy Guggenheim: Petersfield MUSEUM Petersfield to Palazzo

The Guggenheim name is synony-. mous with the great cities of New York, Bilbao and Venice, but less so with an historic market town in Hampshire. However, an exhibition opening in the summer of 2024 is aiming to change that.

Before buying the Palazzo Venier dei Leoni and the garden behind it in Venice in 1949, for five years (between 1934 and 1939), world-famous 20th-century patron and collector of modern art Peggy Guggenheim (1898-1979) lived at Yew Tree Cottage near Petersfield.

Featuring a focused selection of artworks once owned by the self-described 'art addict', Peggy Guggenheim: Petersfield to Palazzo will show together paintings and sculptures by leading British and European modern artists including Henry Moore (1898-1986), Yves Tanguy (1900-1955), Max Ernst (1891-1976), Jean Arp (1886-1966) and John Tunnard (1900-1971) amongst others. A variety of photographs, contemporary fashion items and literature will give further context to the fascinating life and times of Peggy Guggenheim.

The exhibition includes loans from the Peggy Guggenheim Collection, Venice - whose Director, Karole P. B. Vail, is Peggy Guggenheim's elder granddaughter.

In 1938, aged 39, Peggy Guggenheim opened Guggenheim Jeune, an art gallery in London, beginning a career that would significantly influence the course of art in the second half of the 20th- century. Encouraged by her friend, Irish novelist Samuel Beckett (1906-1989), Guggenheim dedicated herself to contemporary art as if it



was "a living thing," while Marcel Duchamp (1897-1968) introduced her to other artists and taught her, as she put it, "the difference between abstract and Surrealist art." The gallery's first show presented works by Jean Cocteau (1889-1963), and the second was the first solo exhibition of works by Wassily Kandinsky (1886-1944) in the UK, followed by solo shows given to Yves Tanguy and Rita Kernn-Larsen (1904-1988), among others.

The exhibition at Petersfield Museum and Art Gallery aims to explore the multitude of literary, artistic, and intellectual figures of the period with whom Guggenheim interacted and reveal the fascinating untold story of her life in the town and neighbouring West Sussex through her family, friends and lovers.

Peggy Guggenheim inherited her share of the family fortune seven years after her father, Benjamin Guggenheim, died during the Titanic's doomed maiden voyage from England to the United States in 1912. On her 21st birthday, she became financially independent. However, in defiance of the conventions and traditions of her upbringing, in 1920 she was a clerk at the modern bookshop in New York, The Sunwise Turn. Here, she encountered avant-garde writers and artists, including Laurence Vail (1891-1968) whom she married and had two children. Sindbad and Pegeen.

Before long though, Guggenheim arrived in Paris and soon found herself at the heart of the city's bohème and American expatriate society.

By the summer of 1934, she had relocated, this time with her current partner Douglas Garman (1903-1969),

and was renting Warblington Castle, near Langstone, in Hampshire. Soon after, Guggenheim bought Yew Tree Cottage, situated on the road between South Harting and Petersfield, and put it in Douglas' name.

Initially, Guggenheim lived there with Pegeen (while Sindbad lived with her ex-husband Laurence Vail in Austria) but Garman soon moved in with his daughter Debbie. Debbie, her cousin, Kitty Garman (1926-2011) and Pegeen all attended the local Winton House Preparatory School on Petersfield High Street. In the spring of 1935, Sindbad returned to England and between 1936 - 1939 he boarded at Bedales School. Steep, near Petersfield.

Far from her glamorous life as an heiress and art collector, Guggenheim noted that everyday life in Yew Tree Cottage involved such day-to-day things as draughty rooms, water pumps, cooking and trips into Petersfield. A selection of paintings by Flora Twort (1893-1985) of Petersfield and Langstone will complement the exhibition and give a sense of the places and scenes that would have been familiar to Guggenheim at this time. During this period, Yew Tree Cottage was host to Yves Tanguy, who carved a ring for Guggenheim from rosewood grown in the garden. It will be on display in the exhibition, kindly on loan from The Penrose Collection.

By February 1939, Guggenheim was considering a new, more ambitious project and had asked Herbert Read to help her establish a modern art museum in London. She wrote: "We are going to have publications and lectures and be a general living art centre and of course give exhibitions of art." The outbreak of the Second World War interrupted her plans, but the list of artists Read had made in preparation for the scheme did inform Guggenheim's growing collection and, in turn became the basis for her gallery in New York and ultimately her collection in Venice.

Peggy Guggenheim left London and moved to Paris in late 1939. She remained in Paris for a while (where she amassed the bulk of her collection), but then had to leave during the war, in 1941. She returned to New York for a few years (1942-1947) before making Palazzo Venier dei Leoni, overlooking the Grand Canal, her home for the following thirty years.

Writing in her memoir Out of this Century, she said: "I loved Europe more than America, and when the war ended, I couldn't wait to go back. ... On my way there, I decided Venice would be my future home. I had always loved it more than any place on earth and felt I would be happy alone there." After some interior remodelling and with the collection finally installed, in 1951 Guggenheim began to open her home and collection to the public, free of charge, three afternoons a week from Easter to November, and continued to do so until her death in 1979.

From June 2024, some of the treasures held in the Peggy Guggenheim Collection are travelling to Britain, representing a rare opportunity to see them outside of 'La Serenissima', as Louise Weller, Head of Collections and Exhibitions at Petersfield Museum and Art Gallery explains: "This will not be a standard art exhibition, as it is a unique opportunity to use the multi-disciplinary character of Petersfield Museum and Art Gallery; combining artwork, photography, fashion and literature, to tell an often overlooked part of Peggy Guggenheim's extraordinary life."

Karole P. B. Vail says, "It will be wonderful to have an exhibition exploring an unexpected and wonderful little-known chapter in Peggy Guggenheim's eventful life before she began her life as a committed patron of the arts."

There will be an illustrated publication to accompany the exhibition, with essays by Lousie Weller and Karole P.B. Vail.

The darling buds of May

Shakespeare's sonnet, from which this phrase is lifted, may have been written with a good-looking young man in mind, but there can be no doubt it was the blossoming of *Crataegus monogyna* – good old hawthorn – that inspired the imagery.

More than any other tree, the hawthorn has helped to shape the countryside of Britain through its use in hedgerows; even its name comes from the Anglo-Saxon Hagedorn, meaning 'hedge thorn'.

But would it still be as important to us were it not for its impeccable timing? It goes by many names, but one of these is 'mayflower'. The true buds of may burst in February, and come in to leaf through March, but the first flowers appear in April, and the tree is out in all its full glory for early May; as are the young humans whom Shakespeare so admired. Back in the day these would go 'a-maying', heading off into the woods, to reappear only at dawn, loaded down with hawthorn blossom as evidence of their earnest intentions. These days, who knows what they get up to! We lost 11 days in 1752, with the change from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar, and nobody thought to tell *Cretaegus*, but we have already clawed most of that back with the onset of global warming.

There are two conflicting pieces of meteorological advice that emerge from all this. The well-known advice is:

'Cast ne'er a clout 'til May is out'

Most authorities agree that this does not mean you have to wait for the end of May to shed layers of clothes, but rather that you should be good once the may blossom is showing, earlier in the month.

On the other hand:

'When the hawthorn bloom too early shows,

We shall still have many snows.'

You pays your money and you takes your pick. But can we really say we're any better informed by our latter-day, Al-powered forecasts?

Berries and flowers were harvested to make jellies, wines and liqueurs for the winter larder; in times of hunger, the fresh leaves were picked to fill empty stomachs, giving rise to the old name of 'bread and cheese'. I remember, as a lad, I'd heard this, and so, of course, I tried it. I have to say, I wasn't impressed. But then, I never went hungry.

Fortunately, I wasn't tempted to take some home with me. It seems the tree can tolerate a reasonable amount of pruning, without dire consequences, but taking so much as a branch indoors with you can invite down sickness and death. Hawthorn was never brought into the home. It was believed that bringing hawthorn blossom inside would be followed by illness and death, and in medieval times it was said that hawthorn blossom smelled like the Great Plague. Botanists later learned that the chemical trimethylamine in hawthorn blossom is also one of the first chemicals formed in decaying animal tissue, so it is not surprising that hawthorn flowers are associated with death.

Hawthorns are hermaphrodite, meaning both male and female reproductive parts are contained within each flower. Flowers are highly scented, white or occasionally pink with five petals, and grow in flat-topped clusters. The flowers of common hawthorn have a single stigma, whereas Midland hawthorn (Crataegus laevigata) has two. Hawthorn can support hundreds of other species. It is the foodplant for caterpillars of moths, including the hawthorn, orchard ermine, pear leaf blister, rhomboid tortrix, light emerald, lackey, vapourer, fruitlet-mining tortrix, small eggar and lappet moths. Its flowers are eaten by dormice and provide nectar and pollen for bees and other pollinating insects. The haws are rich in antioxidants and are eaten by migrating birds, such as redwings, fieldfares and thrushes, as well as small mammals.

The dense, thorny foliage makes fantastic nesting shelter for many species of bird.

Ways We Can Help Our Bentley Hedgehogs!

In Bentley, we're very lucky to have a population of hedgehogs. Nationally, hedgehogs are struggling, especially in rural areas where changes to the landscape, such as the loss of field margins and hedgerows, are attributed to their decline.

In the countryside, villages are the hedgehog's preferred location. Therefore, if we want to protect our spiky friends, all of us need to do what we can to create a hedgehog-friendly environment.

Bentley Wildlife Group has collated some practical tips on how each of us can contribute to hedgehog conservation efforts. Why not try some of these for yourself?

1. Hedgehog Highways

Hedgehogs cover around a mile every night hunting for food. Our gardens are ideal hunting grounds, but fences and walls often block their path. Creating "hedgehog highways" involves strategically placing small gaps or holes for their passage. By removing bricks, cutting holes or digging shallow channels, we allow hedgehogs to move freely between gardens. Collaborate with neighbours to establish access points and choose hedgehog-friendly fencing.

2. Avoid Slug Pellets

Hedgehogs are natural pest controllers, feeding on slugs and snails. Using slug pellets can harm hedgehogs directly and indirectly by depleting their food source and potentially causing longterm health issues. Embrace wildlife-friendly gardening to create a thriving ecosystem, and let hedgehogs naturally control slug populations.

3. Provide Hedgehog-Friendly Food

Supplement hedgehog diets with wet cat or dog food or specialised hedgehog food, especially during cold or dry spells when insects are scarce. Maintain a fresh water source for hydration, particularly in warmer months.

4. Create Habitat and Shelter

Log piles, compost heaps and overgrown areas attract insects, becoming vital hedgehog food sources as well as nesting and hibernation sites. Install hedgehog houses in quiet, shady spots for additional shelter, but avoid disturbing them, especially during hibernation.

5. Drive with Caution

Reduce hedgehog road casualties by driving cautiously, especially from dusk to dawn when hedgehogs are active. Slowing down and staying alert can save lives and contribute to the overall wellbeing of our local hedgehog population.

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

Bentley Station Meadow nature reserve

his 12 acre site is owned by Butterfly Conservation and is located just across from Bentley Station. It's along a woodland edge with wet meadows and blackthorn scrub, ideal for the Brown Hairstreak butterfly. There is a dedicated team of volunteers that help manage the reserve and have done so for many years. The past few years have seen the meadows become swamped by bramble and blackthorn making it a struggle for wildflowers to survive. The site was designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest for its botanical diversity. The volunteers have cleared huge areas of bramble this winter so we're looking forward to seeing how it responds. We'll be meeting up over the summer months on 12th June, 10th July and 7th August. 
