The clocks have gone back and the nights are drawing in. After a warm, dry summer; winter is coming.

The church is exactly the same. It seems that for the Benefice, we are seeing the signs of spring. New people are joining us, new projects are taking off and those who saw us through the winter season are tired from keeping the fires going and deserve a rest. It is always exciting to see the new things God is doing. Not all the seeds will grow, but spring is a season of hope and possibility. As a nation we might say we are also still in the grips of winter. But spring is coming.

Our task, in whatever season, is to watch and pray. To see what God is doing and seek to act in accordance with it. My prayer for you all, is that you will see your season and have the faith to thank God for all that he has done, and the faith to trust for all that he will do. May God make you fruitful and bless you all.





ALLEN GALLERY

The Allen Gallery in Church Street, Alton was successful in receiving funding from multiple sources, including the National Lottery Heritage Fund, East Hampshire District Council and Alton Town Council for a redevelopment. The redevelopment project started in May 2025 and the project team at Hampshire Cultural Trust are now planning for the scheduled capital works to begin in early 2026.

This ambitious project will transform the Allen Gallery into a more welcoming, accessible and inspiring space for everyone, with new displays, a dedicated community area, and a programme of ceramicsinspired creative workshops and activities for all ages.

The schedule of capital works being undertaken will mean a period of closure for this work to be carried out which will be as follows:

- End of December 2025: The Allen Gallery closes to the public
- · Throughout 2026: work is carried out at the venue
- · Early 2027: The gallery will reopen to the public.

During the closed period there will be a range of community programmes and creative activities, much of which will take place at the Curtis Museum and other local venues. These will include family workshops, volunteering opportunities, and special events designed to bring people together and celebrate Alton's heritage.

Binsted Church Needs Your Help



The European Aspen, Populus tremula, is one of the most widespread and ecologically significant deciduous trees across the cooler temperate zones of Europe and Asia. Instantly recognisable by its distinctive, shimmering foliage, it was well known to Shakespeare, who wrote in HenrylVp2:

Feel masters, how I shake ... Yea, in very truth do I, An 'twere an aspen leaf.

I don't see many round these parts. The soil is not ideal. But I did take shelter under a fine specimen when I visited the botanical marvels of Polesden Lacey at the very height of this summer's heat wave.

Aspen gets its name from its remarkable leaf movement. The nearly circular, coarselytoothed leaves are attached to the branches by long, flattened leaf stalks. This unique structural feature acts like a hinge, causing the leaves to flutter, tremble, and quake in the slightest breeze, producing a soft, constant rustling sound that gives the aspen its popular epithet, the "Whisperer of the Woods."

It's a fast-growing tree that typically reaches a height of 25-30 meters.

The leaves emerge a coppery-bronze colour in spring before maturing to grey-green. In autumn, they turn a brilliant golden-yellow before dropping.

The trees are dioecious, meaning male and female flowers (catkins) appear on separate trees in early spring before the leaves.

However, often its primary method of propagation is vegetative reproduction via root suckers. The tree forms extensive, interconnected underground root systems that can span large areas. New stems, or ramets, sprout directly from these roots, resulting in genetically identical individuals that can form vast clonal colonies

While the aspen also produces a prodigious amount of tiny, wind-dispersed seeds, its vegetative cloning capability is what allows it to guickly colonize and dominate disturbed ground. securing its long-term presence on a site.

The European Aspen is referred to as a keystone species due to the sheer number of organisms that rely on it. As a fast-growing, light-demanding pioneer species, the aspen is perfectly adapted to colonise clearings left by wildfires, tempests, or clear-cutting. Its rapid growth and suckering ability help stabilize disturbed soil and provide quick cover, creating the necessary shade and soil conditions for less tolerant, longer-lived climax species (like spruce or beech) to eventually establish underneath.

Aspen supports a massive web of life. It is considered to host more species-specific invertebrates and fungi than any other tree, providing essential food and habitat for a high diversity of insects, mosses, lichens, and birds.

Like its North American relative, the aspen is highly resilient to fire. While its thin bark

makes it easily top-killed, the massive underground root system is protected and quickly responds to the fire by sending up a huge flush of vigorous suckers, ensuring the stand's immediate renewal.

Historically, the European Aspen's wood was not prized for structural use due to its relative lightness and softness. However, the wood is favoured for the pulp and paper industry, especially for producing high-quality writing paper, due to its low lignin content and easy bleaching. Its light colour, lack of odour, and small shrinkage make it suitable for manufacturing matches, lolly sticks, and veneer.

Its rapid growth rate and ability to regenerate quickly make it a strong candidate for biomass and bioenergy production.

Despite the rise of commercial hybrids in forestry, conservationists are focused on maintaining the genetic integrity of native P. tremula populations.

School News - Binsted CE Primary

At Binsted we believe in the Christian values of Faith, Hope & Love.

On a bright September day Beech class set off on their school trip to Butser Ancient Farm as part of their topic on Stone Age to Iron Age. We spent the morning traveling through the amazing selection of replica buildings. We all sat around the fire and listened as our guide explained the significance of this period of history. It was fascinating to hear how creative and artistic the Stone



Age people were. We began with the earliest stone age buildings discussing the features and design and the use of different materials. We also talked about how farming changed how people lived. One of these changes meant that pottery became important for storing and preserving the crops which are harvested. Beech Class enjoyed forming and making their own clay pots and the final products were impressive. As we moved towards the bronze age and iron age, we noticed

how the buildings became stronger and more secure, with the addition of metal cooking pots and accessories.

During the afternoon the children tried out spinning using wool from sheep farmed by the stone age people and jewellery making from metal. The children made their own bronze ring using ancient techniques. Jewellery was significant for the bronze age people who were also creative and artistic. We finished the day by ending our journey at the Roman Villa, complete with grape vines and roman toilets. The children loved sitting on the toilet and were amused by the roman alternative to toilet paper!



Despite coming home like we had spent the day around a campfire, we all had a very engaging and fun day with lots of learning thrown in.

Autumn Thoughts

As I've grown older, I've become more and more aware that many of us, myself included, tend to view the approach and arrival of autumn with some trepidation - I confess that I personally haven't always felt ready for the impending bareness of trees as they shed their leaves, or the letting go of the joys of long days, and I've been known to complain to anyone who would listen when the end of summer came! Lused to see autumn, and of course the approach of winter as an interruption to life, and I often resented the necessity of letting go of the 'fun' of summer.

And yet, maybe because I've grown older, I welcome this season more willingly now. To me it's become a special season with a mystery all of its own, as life around us changes, moving on into new forms and shapes, in nature dying that it may live again. Macrina Wiederkehr wrote, "Autumn, with its unforgettable face of both acceptance and surrender, ushers in the sacrament of absence." And she goes on to say that this absence can be a blessing - our lives so easily become cluttered with many things, and this is the season that invites us to let go, to evaluate what is good to keep, and what perhaps we could relinquish in our lives.

There are so many forms of letting go that emerge out of our autumn surrenders - so many "falling leaves" that we seem to have to deal with. I think of parents letting go of their children as they head off to uni, or move away from home, entrusting them into Hands greater than their own; I think of for some the relinquishing of a lifestyle, and the necessity that comes to slow down; I think of letting go of unhelpful patterns of thinking that can cripple us and hold us in places where we have no hope of growing.

In John 12: 24 Jesus tells us, "The truth is, a kernel of wheat must be planted in the soil. Unless it dies, it will be alone - a single seed. But its death will produce many new kernels - a plentiful harvest of new lives."

It reminds me of the story of two little girls who were helping their mum do some gardening and planting seeds. As they dug the holes, the younger girl said to her sister, 'I hate planting seeds. It reminds me of digging graves and burying people.' And her sister replied, 'Oh I don't think of it like that – I look forward to the time when they wake up and grow into beautiful flowers.'

During this season of autumn, I wonder what would be revealed to us if we were to look within both our cupboards and our hearts to see what we could discard, what we might live better without, and what we could perhaps let go of, or bury, in order to create space and opportunity for something even better, more beautiful, to grow in the spring?

Be blessed this beautiful autumn season of reflection!

Holy Cross Day

Sunday September 14th 2025 HOLY CROSS CHURCH BINSTED

This was a very special Benefice Service, gathering together to mark Holy Cross Day, commemorated since the 7th Century, where the significance and power of the cross in our Christian faith is celebrated.

Everyone had pulled together to spruce up the church following the works on the East Window and the surrounding stonework. The wonderful cleaning team had dusted and polished, and the flower team had created beautiful arrangements which mirrored the colours in the East Window -and amazingly the weather stayed dry!

We were ready to give thanks at the end of the journey of the repair and restoration to the East Window. In 2019 the condition of the window was giving cause for concern and a report commissioned from Salisbury Cathedral Stained Glass confirmed that the glass, the supporting leadwork and surrounding masonry were all in need of urgent attention.

Research began into identifying grant bodies which might be willing to give us a grant towards the costs. We held a number of fundraising events at which the church and village communities

gave generously towards the costs. In conversation with specialised grant bodies we began to appreciate that we were extremely fortunate to have a window by Capronnier in our rural parish church.

The East Window is dated 1875 and is the work of a

Binsted is in distinguished company. At the Paris Exhibition in 1855 he won the only medal awarded for glass painting. He was awarded prizes at a number of prestigious international exhibitions and was also an entomologist specialising in Lepidoptera (butterflies and moths). He was instrumental in the revival of the art of glass painting and his name is inscribed at the base of the central portion of the window.



Belgian stained glass painter Jean-Baptiste Capronnier who is still well respected by experts. He created windows for churches in Brussels, Bruges, Amsterdam, France and Italy, so Holy Cross, The window commemorates two ladies: Henrietta Standen and Emily Andrews. They both had local connections -Henrietta's son William was an alumnus of Emmanuel College, Cambridge and in

1862 he left the curacy at East Worldham to become the curate at Holy Cross, Binsted where he remained until 1870 which was also the year of his mother's death. Following a period of time at Sheet, he became Vicar of Long Sutton where he remained in office until his death in 1902.

Emily Andrews was the daughter of John and Ann Vamdell, the miller at Groveland Mill near Bentley. In 1852 Emily married Frederic Andrews in Bentley. Frederic was a tenant farmer and hop planter at Roxfords, Binsted and Frederic was churchwarden from 1859 -1892. Many of the Andrews family are buried in Holy Cross Churchyard. Emily died in 1872 aged 47 and was laid to rest in Holy Cross Churchyard.

It is tempting to conjecture that the Rev William Standen and Frederic Andrews might have jointly sponsored the East Window but to date, no firm evidence has been found either to confirm or refute this. However, we were delighted to have a direct descendant of Emily Andrews in the service on Sunday and she is researching family papers which appear to indicate that the funds for the window were in part "a thanksgiving gift" from the church and village community. That sounds very "Binsted" but there's more to be discovered about that!

There is a small display in the church which highlights the timeline of the repairs and restoration from 2019-2025. The glass has been restored, cleaned and repaired by Dan Humphries Stained Glass of Glastonbury. We were delighted to have him and his wife Sue, who is also part of his team, with us in the service on Sunday and they appreciated seeing the window back in its rightful place. We are also grateful to Danny Rushman of Traditional Stone Restoration of Rudgwick who worked on the surrounding masonry.

Matt preached, emphasising that the picture of Iesus being taken down from the cross on our East Window is not the end of the story. We rejoice in the Easter story of the Resurrection which gives us eternal hope. The service ended with the hymn "Thine be the glory, risen, conquering Son, endless is the victory thou o'er death hast won".

Over refreshments at the end of the service, it was really interesting to note how many people, many of whom have been worshipping in Holy Cross for several years, have commented on the new vibrancy of the colours in the East Window. Many of us have noticed details not seen before the restoration. The expressions on the people gathered at the foot of the cross remind us all of the impact Jesus's crucifixion must have had on those who were close to him. Some of us were drawn to the distant views, the trees on the far hill whilst others noticed the richness of the colours in Joseph of Arimathea's red and gold coat. He is said in the Bible to be a rich man but it was he who asked Pilate for the body of Jesus after the crucifixion so he could provide a proper burial in his own new tomb.

There are so many details to absorb in Capronnier's wonderful window. The sun shone through the glass during the service and Ollie Porter has taken some stunning photos of the service.

If you haven't yet seen the East Window restored, do please take a moment to pop up to Holy Cross Church and see it for yourself. If you visit on a Wednesday morning between 10.00am-12pm in term time, do pop into The Wickham Institute for coffee/tea and cake before you leave.

The Bentley Fete 2025

aving been involved with the Bentley fete since I moved to the village in 1998 I thought I had seen it all. Over the years we have had heavy rain on a few occasions and gale force winds, but the fete has always gone ahead. I think it has been warm and sunny on about 80% of the fetes I have participated in.

This year was something different. The Bentley Archers cricket club were getting the recreation ground resurfaced and 4 new wickets were being laid. This work was going to be done 3 months before the fete to allow the grass to recover and be walked upon by mid July. The early summer drought meant the grass seed didn't germinate and at the beginning of July the grass was at best sparse with large bare patches. Then someone noticed that there were pieces of glass on the ground and we realised that the outfield had been covered with topsoil contaminated with glass and that this was over the entire recreation ground.

So two weeks before the fete we realised that it could not go ahead on the recreation ground and we had to find another venue. Despite a very kind offer from Froyle to hold it on their recreation ground we were very keen to hold it in the village. We had a look at Carters meadow, next to School Lane, and thought we could hold it there. However, we had a problem with the size of the ground. We used about 8000m² of the recreation ground for the fete and Carters meadow was 2600m² and an awkward shape. Plus the grass was long and there were brambles all around the edges of the meadow.

> Matt Leward came to the rescue with his agricultural mower to cut the grass and then Sophie, his partner, cut the meadow twice with their lawn tractor and collected all the grass trimmings. The rest of cutting the brambles back at the



the available area. We also had to level the area where the bonfire is held and managed to collect about 75kg of nails from old pallets that we had burnt there.

We managed a plan for the fete that was compact to say the least, but we fitted a marquee, all the stalls and the food and drink area onto the meadow. There was no space for the central arena but we still managed a tug of war, until the rope broke! The final piece of the jigsaw was the car show and we held this on the Fox Hall lawn together with a prosecco stand.

All we then needed was good weather and in the driest summer for many years we woke up to rain on the morning of the fete. Luckily it all stopped by mid morning and the rest of the day was dry and not too hot. Perfect for a village fete.

We finally finished the preparation for the fete at 12.55 for a 13.00 start. Down to wire or what!

How did it go? Feedback from our emergency fete has been universally positive and the smaller area worked well with a few caveats. Moving the fete from the recreation ground meant we needed to hire a big generator, metal fencing to secure the area and needed a bigger marquee so the teas could be accommodated. I think we have learnt a lot about how to lay out a fete which we can use to plan when the fete hopefully moves back to the recreation ground.






